Tarrant County Bond Program

- ➤ City requested \$200,050,000, which included 11 arterials, grade separated railroad crossing, 12 intersections, and traffic signals.
- > Tarrant County approved \$71,660,000 for 4 arterials and 1 grade separated railroad crossing
- > City to seek additional Tarrant County bond funding for special, interjurisdictional projects
