### Establishment

- Neighborhood Patrol Officers
  - -First introduced in 1985
  - Chief Thomas Windham and Mayor Kay Granger
  - -Federal grant money funded 4 positions
    - Community Relations Officers
    - Primary tasks focused on Crime Prevention

### Initial Expansion

- December 1991
  - 40 Neighborhood Patrol Officer positions were created with 4 Sergeants
  - Defined geographical area of responsibility
  - Partnered with Code Blue
  - Focused on Part 1 Crime Reduction
    - Murder
    - Sexual Assault
    - Robbery
    - Aggravated Assault
    - Burglary
    - Theft
    - Auto Theft

### Code Blue-Citizens on Patrol

- New Volunteer Program started in 1991
  - Eyes and Ears
  - Force Multiplier
  - Double Digit Crime Reduction
- Neighborhood Patrol Officers supporting element to Code Blue
  - Recruited
  - Trained

## Crime Control and Prevention District

- Prior to 1995-unit expanded to 55 officers
- In 1995 Citizens Voted ½ cent Sales Tax
- Funds allowed expansion of NPO program
  - Expanded to 75 Officers
  - A Neighborhood Police officer assigned to each beat.

### Growth and Expansion

- NPOs increased to match population growth
- Currently have 87 NPOs
- 10 Sergeants
- 87 NPOs assigned to patrol beats

### Duties of the NPO

- Problem Solvers for the Community
  - Neighborhood Associations
  - Neighborhood Crime Watch Groups
  - Businesses and their groups
  - Apartment Complexes
  - Code Enforcement
  - Community Engagement Office
  - Mayor and Council
  - Planning and Zoning
  - Streets and Parks

### Duties of the NPO

- Special Events
  - Organization
  - Coordination
  - Traffic Control and Security
  - Calls for Service and High Priority Calls

### Duties of the NPO

- Crime Trend Analysis for Their Beat
  - Weekly Beat Reports
  - 24 hour responsibility
  - Liaison with Detectives
  - Liaison with Crime Analysts
  - Nuisance abatement and Quality of Life Issues
- Coordinate with Beat Officers
- Coordinate with Crime Prevention Specialists

### Other Community Policing Efforts

- Code Blue-Citizens on Patrol
  - Recruit and Train
  - Monitor Patrollers
  - Meet/Provide Crime Information to Members
- Ministers Against Crime
- Clergy and Police Alliance
- Citizen's Police Academy
  - English and Spanish

### Coordinating with your NPO

- Search One Address for your NPO
- Email or Call your NPO (First.Last@fortworthtexas.gov)
- Attend a Neighborhood Association meeting or a police forum
- Allow your NPO time to resolve your problem or make a referral
- Contact the NPO supervisor with concerns
- Contact the Division Lieutenant or Commander

### Code or Police or Someone Else

- Your NPO should be able to help you regardless of your problem
- NPOs are experts at finding the right resource to resolve a problem
- They often coordinate with other police divisions, Code, TPW or other City departments

### Common Neighborhood Problems

- Problematic Neighbors
  - Noise or other Disturbance
  - Trash or Overgrowth
  - Drugs or Suspicious Behavior
- Illegal Parking
  - Front Yard vs Back Yard
  - Abandon or Stored on the Street
- Panhandlers
  - Loitering or Door-to-Door
- Increased Crime



### Crime Prevention Basics

- Ask your Neighborhood Association to host a Crime Prevention Class
- Join Neighborhood Watch or Code Blue
- Crime Triangle—Increase Guardianship
  - Make an Investment in a Camera System

This progressive gang-intervention program serves more than 700 gang-involved youth between the ages of 13-24 years old in Fort Worth communities. In partnership with the City of Fort Worth, the program provides needs-based services and activities in an effort to reduce gang violence and influence positive change.

Comin' Up is a program of Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Tarrant County. The mission of the Club is to provide enriching programs for youth to develop the qualities needed to become responsible citizens.

The Club's after school experience—focusing on Academic Success, Healthy Lifestyles and Positive Citizenship—and outreach programs in the schools and community, help change the odds for youth year after year.

#### The Purpose of Comin' Up

- · Identify and provide extended services for gang-involved youth
- Provide case management services
- Develop specific plans of action to meet the needs & interests of each youth
- Provide needs-based services through a network of collaborating organizations and agencies
- Establish truces among rival gangs members

#### **Program Offerings**

Comin' Up Gang Intervention offers a variety of programs for gang involved youth, beginning at age 13 up to 24 years old.

Programs include:

- Inter-site activities
- Special court docket
- G.E.D. and tutoring
- Conflict resolution
- Career certification
- Career exploration
- Community service projects
- Educational field trips
- Social recreation activities

#### **Benefits**

- Access to caring staff in a safe location. Service centers feature gyms, work-out equipment, Internet and social recreation activities.
- Access to educational services with a focus on GED / diploma attainment, tutoring, TAKS help and college enrollment preparation.
- Access to specialized career programs, offering coursework, tuition and fees assistance, and job placement services.

Service centers are open from 7 to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday.

#### Who can join and how do I join?

Gang-involved youth, regardless of affiliation, are welcome to participate in the program. Comin' Up is available for individuals ages 13 to 24 years old. Contact the service location nearest you for more information.

#### What type of career training do you offer?

Comin' Up's career program helps youth enroll in job training programs and seek employment, as well as complete GED programs and enroll in college.


#### **Early Childhood Services**


