EVANS & ROSEDALE PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT WORKSHOP SUMMARY

WHERE ARE YOU FROM

Residents were asked to identify where they live and work by placing a thumb tack on the map – a red tack for where they live and a blue tack for where they work. Three scales of maps – Fort Worth, Historic Southside, Evans & Rosedale were provided.

URBAN VILLAGES

The history, details and locations of Fort Worth's urban villages were provided to residents, so they could better conceptualize Evans & Rosedale in context with the city's other urban villages. Residents were encouraged to examine this background information, and share their thoughts about urban villages in general, or about Evans & Rosedale in the context of the city's other urban villages.

HONORING LOCAL HISTORY, CULTURE AND PROMINENT PEOPLE

A timeline was provided that showed important historical and cultural events in the history of the Evans & Rosedale community. Residents were encouraged to share their thoughts on any important history, culture, or prominent locals from the area that were missing.

What is the story of Evans & Rosedale?

- This community had the highest level of education in Fort Worth, with doctors, teachers, attorneys, etc.
- Catalog of historic breakthrough Black businesses and professional pioneers situated in the area
- 1800s established St. Andrews UMC a long-standing Black church and cradle of numerous Fort Worth community leaders and educators. The church has achieved a Historic Landmark designation.
- 1929 Our Lady of Mercy Church (now Sunshine Cumberland). The church was purchased by Brazos River Presbyterian in 1955 and was pastored by Rev. Harold W. Gant for 40 years, and is now pastored by Rev. A.L. Gipson.
- During the 1950s, Black men had to patrol the alley from Allen Ave. to Vickery Blvd., as White men would place satchel bombs under the houses of Black homeowners.
- 1960s saw the start of 1163 Evans Ave. Cleaners (x2)
- 1977 Tarrant County Black Historical and Genealogical Society was established.
- 2005 the refurbishment of Boone House began.
- 2011 Lenora Rolla Heritage Center Museum opened
- Evans Avenue Plaza (year?)
- Barrets Day School
- Universal Life Insurance Company Black-owned business on Evans Ave.

Additional discussion

- There are some long-time residents in the area who are still living, reach out to them (x2)
- Look at Reba Cary's authored collection of books on Black leaders and organizations for those endemic to this area.
- Look at Calvin Littlejohn's book of photography for a broader history of Fort Worth's African American community and the Southside, more specifically.

How do we preserve, honor and share our history with others?

- Improve/expand Lenora Rolla Heritage Center (x4)
- Recreate music venues (x3)
- Honor but modernize interface (walking tours, electronic/interactive, etc.) (x3)
- Fund the residential/museum of Southside History (Opal Lee) (x2)
- Current residents cannot be pushed out (x2)
 - Grandfather property taxes

- More quality, Black-owned businesses in neighborhood (x2)
 - o Anchor institutions and city-backed funding for micro-enterprises to address local underemployment in Southside, a R/ECAP neighborhood
- Honor and preserve the Grand Theatre (x2)
- Public art emphasis (x2)
- Annual festival to honor history / Black History Month celebrations (x2)
 - o Talk to Lee Littlefield about Sankofa festival, or a music/arts festival to celebrate Black contributions to the Arts, held on Evans
- Banners on light posts with images of prominent/historical leaders and personalities (x2)
- Buildings named after historical figures
- Neighborhood historical tours
- Prop up and connect Evans & Rosedale to TCBHGS

PRIORITIZING BUSINESS/ACTIVITY TYPES

Residents were shown the 2005 Master Plan for the Evans & Rosedale Urban Village, as well as some of the business and activity types that have been identified by the community during previous engagement events. Residents were asked to vote for businesses and activities that they would like to see in the neighborhood by placing thumb tacks next to the options, and by writing in other types that were not listed. Additionally, they identified specific locations on the map of where they'd like to see specific activities.

ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN AND PROGRAMMING

By voting with thumbtacks, staff tried to get a sense of what residents hope to see in their neighborhood, both in terms of amenities and design expression. Residents were asked questions to

determine what good design means to them, and encouraged them to discuss specific buildings, places, materials, or anything else that they associate with good design. Examples could be from Fort Worth or anywhere else.

Categories and comments are listed below.

- Shading (29 votes)
 - o Trees would be nice if city did maintenance regularly
 - o Needed on some buildings (referring to awnings)
 - o Plant more trees
 - o Make it vibrant/colorful
- Seating (26 votes)
 - Different kinds of seating

 - o 20 jazz musicians that came from this neighborhood (x3)
 - o Love concept of abstract downtown Fort Worth sculpture

 - o Mix of abstract/symbolic, sculpture and figurative/portraiture art
- Play (23 votes)

- o I would one day love to allow my kid to walk to school unassisted. She is what drives how we would love the neighborhood to be.

ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN AND PROGRAMMING SUMMARY

- There is a palpable sense that the city does not do enough in the neighborhood, in terms
 of providing safe environment. Not enough sidewalks, lighting on the streets, and
 enforcement of city ordinances.
- Several people thought that just fixing the current light poles that are not working would improve the neighborhood.
- Emphasis on local business and not fast-food chains.
- Music came up several times with several people.
- Making the area walkable and providing places for children and pets to play. This was
 particularly important for some of the young families that attended, but also the older,
 empty nesters who are pet owners.
- There is an overall call for maintaining or recalling the cultural identity and history of the neighborhood. There's a feeling that new buildings should be 'unique' and to avoid looking like other parts of the city.
- Housing should be affordable.
- There is a fear that benches and some of the referenced images may result in more homeless people hanging out in the neighborhood.

- Community needs to be known for the leadership it produced
- Historical value architecture, business
- Its historical culture and history
- Southside is a historic African American neighborhood
- Significance of Evans Ave. Cleaners much history, Black-owned, pass through family, 1163 Evans Ave.
- Cultural entertainment hub for FW
- Jazz club
- The Arts
- Family-friendly
- Local job incubators to support local jobs and businesses
- Redevelopment that affirms fair housing
 - o In a neighborhood with homelessness

HOPES AND FEARS SUMMARY

• There is a lot of incredible African American history in this neighborhood that needs to be recognized and incorporated into its future development.

- Recognize the important history of music and jazz in this area specifically.
- Allow this to be the walkable, culturally-specific neighborhood it was in the past.
- Support local, healthy restaurants and grocery / markets.
- Support local, Black-owned businesses.
- Most residents identified Magnolia as a good example for Evans & Rosedale's scale and variety, though this growth should reflect this specific community.
- Include the community in the development process and make sure that they are not excluded from the future of this neighborhood due to increased prices.
- Residents want local development, as opposed to chains.
- It's essential to provide housing options and business rental space options for local residents at costs that they can afford.
- Address homelessness by spreading out homeless options across the city, instead of putting them all in one location.

TYPE AND TIMELINE OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Residents were shown a timeline of the city's understanding of some of the community engagement events that have occurred in the Evans & Rosedale neighborhood. Residents were encouraged to add more events to the timeline, and to share any ideas about what they consider "meaningful" community engagement, with specific notes about how they would like to be involved in the development process moving forward.

What is meaningful community engagement?

- Jobs in the area that pay above poverty level incomes (x2)
- Events in park, like Clyde Park in Dallas (x2)
- That the community is not forgotten, that we are engaged and informed and asked.
- Transparency and open dialogue
- Continuous voice and a seat/vote in decisions, not RFEI/RFQ-based continuous and substantive
- Engage and empower the churches that stood in the footprint for 100+ years
 - o Because social media, mailers, phone calls are not enough to communicate with this neighborhood effectively
- More public events at Hazel Harvey Peace Center
- Developer accountability to HSNA collaboration
- Today's process/opportunity is wonderful, need more similar events as development timeline progresses. Other town hall consults also.
- This is an excellent event.
- People in the community working together to/for the good of the community
- Real-time input / feedback using the software that is commercially available like Zen Desk
- Preserve the community's historic value
- School upgrades

How would you like to be involved?

- Working with youth in the community (x3)
- Community involvement (x2)
- Assisting the neighborhood with having that continuous voice (x2)
- Newsletter updates and being a warm body to help pull off this change
- Go to present businesses that are open and speak with them, as well as the Historic Southside Neighborhood Association
- I would volunteer to help with community education
- I want to meet developer
- I would like to help create a community garden
- Events in the park like Clyde Park in Dallas
- School upgrade Stop Six to same level as richer communities
- Economic stability jobs (good-paying) above poverty income levels
- Interest in small business to develop on nearby property
- Community resident/youth programs
- Assistance in renewing the minds of the people in the community (education on living, owning, etc.)

TYPE AND TIMELINE OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT SUMMARY

- There is a strong sense of ownership of the neighborhood among residents and community members.
- Community members appreciated the ability to voice their desires and concerns with the Evans & Rosedale Urban Village project, and unanimously expressed an interest in remaining involved with the process; residents want to give input.
- A number of community members stated that they were frustrated with not knowing what was happening in terms of the development and remained skeptical that this time it would happen (referring to the amount of time it has taken to see changes within the neighborhood.)
- Most expressed that they enjoyed the day's workshop, although they preferred the process to be more democratic (not RFEI/RFQ based process).
- All residents identified the need for other social efforts and programs (i.e. education programs and resources for community members) in addition to redevelopment in order to revitalize the neighborhood.
- All residents identified the desire for the process to be as transparent as possible.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Residents were asked to provide any thoughts on the future of Evans & Rosedale that were not addressed in other areas.

Don't forget about the current residents, don't push them out! (x2)

- Need more lighting in the city (x2)
- Property value increase is key (x2)
- Infill housing with historically accurate housing (x2)
- Need aggressive stance by city on pushing back against displacement and gentrification (x2)
- Rosedale and Fabons Street: City needs to relocate Sami and Stoner lines!
- Have our city officials care about the citizens east of I-35

o Amen

- Take care of the homeless issue
- Talk to people who "know", not "heard"
- 24-hour community center
- Decent planning session with community
- Change the culture that embraces hopeless thoughts
