- * Better visual connections between downtown and the southside...clean up the underpasses... better lighting for evening passage...art on the walls...pressure wash....paint.
- Clara Love Elementary from Harriet Creek Ranch subdivision. Pike Middle School, NISD Administration Building, Northwest High School from Harriet Creek as well.
- † The park by Z Boaz near Benbrook. There are very few sidewalks along Vickery and fast moving traffic. Also keeping vehicles off the Trinity Trail Path would be helpful.
- * Access to Trinity Trails and downtown!
- * "Oakmont park along Oakmont blvd from Hulen St. Riding my bicycle down Oakmont is dangerous but in doing so I am connected to Oakmont park and the trail system along Bellaire. Also need a bike/pedestrian friendly crossing for Granbury rd at Woolens Way to Granbury Cutoff St. That would open up access from the bike lanes on Trail Lake to the park"
- * "Ridgmar Mall, Hulen Mall, City View area. Ridglea Hills Elementary, Monnig Middle, AHHS. LMRA. Z Boaz golf course & RD Evans Community Center. Como Community Center. FW Zoo. Ryan Family YMCA. Van Zandt YMCA. Ridglea Library. Southwest Regional Library. Home Depot. Lowes. Target CityView. Tom Thumb. Wal-Mart Neighborhood Market (Vickery)."
- Central High School and shopping along North Tarrant Highway and at intersection with Denton Hwy (Hwy 377). No sidewalks on the north and south of N. Tarrant Parkway between Park Vista and Hwy 377, and on the south side of N. Tarrant Pkwy west of Park Vista. Children walk on the road without sidewalks. The roadway is high speed, dangerous.
- ★ TCU; between Near South Side and Downtown.
- ★ T&P Train Station (vickery side)
- The absolute most-walked path in the whole City is between Union Gospel Mission and the Salvation Army and there is no continuous sidewalk. Besides the referrals between agencies, it's the homeless going back and forth between free breakfast and free lunch, every day, day after day.

- † Heritage Trace and General Worth. Anywhere along Heritage Trace is extremely difficult to cross. This is especially true for families with children. Cars drive TOO fast and disregard the crosswalks.
- * "Heritage trace & general worth is like the indy 500...raised crosswalks would help. More police presence at crosswalks to alert drivers. General worth & dalton has high traffic, many pedestrians, many parents park daily in no parking zone and limit sidewalk crossing visibility. Heritage glen & justin by park, limited sight, high car speeds."

- Alliance Town Center. Sidewalks between shops do not exist. Patrol during drop-off and pickup are needed at Bette Perot. Cars do not stop for crossing guard.

- Many of the T's bus stops in south Fort Worth around Sycamore School Road, Crowley Road, and Alta Mesa do not have any sidewalk leading to them. Pedestrians are frequently walking in these roads to get to these stops.



My lunch time walks are always constrained by no pedestrian crossing of Paddock Viaduct on the north side of downtown and trains sitting across 8th street on the east side. I live near Arcadia Park and walk there often for recreation. Sidewalks and vicinity to Arcadia Park were major deciding factors to buying a house in Park Glen. New sidewalks on Beach Street and Basswood Blvd. since I moved in have made walking to local shopping much more convenient and enjoyable. Ever since I first read about the VeloWeb I've eagerly awaited connection of the Arcadia Park trails to park trails across Fort Worth and the MetroPlex. I dream of being able to bike or hike from the park down the street to any place in the MetroPlex on grade separated pathways.
- I see tons of infrastructure being addressed in the inner city and near to downtown. The suburbs desperately need to be linked to these areas.
- Biggest short term need is filling the gaps in central city sidewalk network
- † I am an avid cyclist so we need to be able to ride bikes to a central location and then walk comfortably within business areas
- A bridge needs to be installed BEFORE school begins in August for the students that will be attending Clara Love Elementary in Harriet Creek Ranch. It is ludicrous that Harriet Creek Park is the impediment to a direct route for these children to school. With the transportation for the elementary school students being discontinued in May, the traffic on the single sidewalk over a very congested bridge with no safety aids leading directly to a state highway and the prominent egress point for the 1420 home community is going to be congested, crowded and dangerous for drivers and students. This community wants to be a walking community, but it must be safe for families. Families should not have to walk around the park to get to school!
- I sometimes work in Downtown FW. Generally very walkable, except as noted above.
- † "Plan for more than you expect. Plan for integrating ped facilities with bike facilities: bike racks, bike share kiosks, water and changing facilities for bike commuters. Think of these connections as what

- they are: circulation of the vital force, the lifeblood of the city, its people. These are not tacked-on amenities we are talking about, they are pathways to commerce, vitality, economic activity, and thriving neighborhoods. IF YOU BUILD IT, THEY WILL COME."
- ★ "IMPORTANT: Use sidewalks sparingly to avoid heat islands. Consider using granite gravel or other natural materials when possible. Use ONLY green cement from responsible providers. Consider runoffs from sidewalks in sensitive environmental areas to avoid erosion."
- † I believe to make Fort Worth a truly walkable city, the speeds on the roads need to be lowered, and the original design of the roads need to be intended to have drivers drive at a slower speed and include many of the beneficial traffic calming features, i.e streets trees lining the roadways, narrower lanes, small scale intersections, etc.
- Just follow the bus routes and see where most of the people get off and cross the street. Anywhere there's not a sidewalk, the closer it is to a school, an apartment, grocery store, etc, the higher the priority for adding that sidewalk.
- † The sidewalks are very poor to non-existent in our neighborhood (Bluebonnet Place). Most walking is done on the streets.
- † I live in Heritage and am fortunate to have many businesses in close proximity. However, it is extremely difficult to walk or bike when traveling with my young children (ages 8,6, and 3). Crossing Heritage Trace and Beach are dangerous and the commercial centers are not designed for pedestrians either. We try but we have had some close calls.
- The kids that walk from bette perot elementary have a dangerous trip when crossing heritage trace as drivers speed and are distracted at this huge intersection. More than one crossing guard is needed, as it's dangerous for her as well. There are no sidewalks from north beach at heritage trace down to shiver. There is the city ymca, and the soccer fields, and yet limited lights, and little or no sidewalks"
- After functional items are complete, such as cross walks, stop lights, smooth sidewalks, it would be nice to have items of interest for the walk. Items such as landscaping, cool way finding signage or art.
- ↑ Often I see runners and cyclists not sharing the park trails or road with one another. I usually run 30 miles a week and the frequency of near accidents is alarming. This is typically caused by cyclists not

- announcing their approach or runners not listening for the cyclists. These two groups need to learn how to share the trails and road with one another before someone is seriously injured.
- * Walking downtown is good. Once you get away from the central business district it gets iffy and you are on your own. Large intersections are difficult to cross because of the lack of respect automobiles have for pedestrians/bicycles. Traffic is generally moving very fast and cars rarely slow down for you, plus they run red lights like they are not even there.
- "Weather barriers, shade/rain shelters for comfort and safety during weather extremes. Traffic/Walk corridors and division barriers where vehicle speeds are normally high. Master planning to ensure public safety decisions are made according to traffic and walking patterns rather than rely on economic, development plans."
- Need better street treatments street trees, bike lanes, trash cans, benches, public art these things make the city feel safer, better maintained, and make it more comfortable to walk in.
- You need to connect the trail that comes down from Golden Triangle to Sinclair Park trail. Right now you have to walk into the Crawford Farms subdivision to get to the Sinclair Park Trail. Also on the Crawford Park Trail, the trail does not have a sidewalk to the streets you have walk over the grass to cross the streets to continue walking the trail. There should also be trash containers that along the trail to put trash in so people would not throw it on the ground. Also some more benches would be nice, also some trees. I know these are expensive but it gets really hot out there and we need more shade.
- * "Please keep the children on Thorp and McFarring safe. Please put a no through traffic sign up and have it enforced. The stop signs at McFarring and Alta Vista as well as Thorp and Brevet need police enforcement. People rarely stop they barely even do a pause. Very dangerous for drivers and pedestrians. Thank you."
- Whenever I visit downtown, I love walking places. Even when I am in north Ft Worth/ Keller area for work, I am able to walk to many places, but near my home in west FTW there is nothing other than my street's and the neighborhood sidewalk. There are stretches of road on Westpoint where kids walk between the elementary and intermediate schools in the middle of the road because there is no sidewalk and people who walk dogs are forced to walk in medians or the road as well. There are also no clearly marked crosswalks at

- any of the intersections and some of our streets are lacking stop signs at the end.
- A city park should not be the impediment for children to be able to reach their school. Without school busses, kids should not be walking AROUND a large city park to get to school...a bridge over the creek in the city park and directly leading to the school would be best for the safety of our children.
- * Would like to see more development in far north Fort Worth so that we could walk more.
- My primary concern is the safety of the children walking/skateboarding/scootering on their way to Clara Love school. Currently the majority of the kids are ride the bus from the Harriet Creek neighborhood to school, but next year there will be no bus. The only way to get to school then, will be to ride in a car or walk around the city park, over the bridge on Harriet Creek drive. The congestion on that bridge is going to be unbelievable next year and unfortunately my faith in my neighbors' driving abilities is not that great. A pedestrian bridge over Harriet "Creek" directly to Clara Love elementary is absolutely necessary in order to ensure the safety of our children. I just pray that something horrible does not have to happen to get our elected officials to pay attention to this matter!
- There is one bridge in our community, the sidewalk is very narrow and this bridge is the major exit route for our whole community which is a bedroom community of approx 1000 homes with multiple vehicles/drivers per home. the northwest isd has pulled bus service which now creates a dangerous walk hazard for our children. there is no way for all the elementary children to ride bikes or walk safely accross this bridge. it is a tragedy waiting to happen. if my daughter were injured on the current bridge, i would sue the city of ft worth for failure to provide the walking bridge that our builder told us was promised by fort worth when we moved in 5 1/2 years ago."
- The city park in the Harriet Creek Ranch neighborhood has in the 'plans' that will include a pedestrian bridge over Harriet Creek. With school budget cuts all the elementary students in Harriet Creek Ranch are losing bus service to and from Clara Love Elementary, the bridge included in the City of Fort Worth plans for Harriet Creek Park NEEDS to be a priority!! There is going to be a MAJOR increase in walkers to and from school AND MORE traffic on Harriet Creek Drive to and from the school. With the NARROW sidewalk on the

bridge on Harriet Creek Drive and the increased traffic, this is just a disaster waiting to happen. The sidewalk edges RIGHT up to the roadway and there is no escape for kids if they were to be pushed or happen to fall off their bikes. It is almost impossible for people going the opposite way to pass each other safely with speeding traffic. This NEEDS to be looked into and NEEDS to be addressed before a kid gets hit by a car!

- My daughter was almost hit by a car while crossing General Worth Drive at Lily Ln. This was 2 years ago. A crosswalk was finally put in, but the signs are obstructed by trees and your can't see it because it is around a curve.
- * "I would be HAPPY to spearhead fundraising to help get a footpath/bridge to Clara Love Elementary. With as many homes as their are in our neighborhood, I feel it is probable that we can raise sufficient money to fund it. We just need the city to build it. If the city won't build it, then I will take matters into my own hands to ensure the safety of our children and have a bridge of some sort built on my own."
- † Important to me are well maintained sidewalks, clear of obstacles (cars, overgrown grass and trees, bulk trash, etc), wide enough for a stroller, with ample shade trees between the sidewalk and street (for comfort & safety). Bicycles should not be permitted to ride on sidewalks and the police should write tickets when people park their cars where they block access. Safety should be a priority and anything to slow and reduce traffic in residential areas should be considered.
- * Walking can only be helped by improved public transit, i.e. Streetcar!!
- Its frustrating to live in a community that claims to have walking / bike trails and realize its just a narrow sidewalk.
- A safe route to Clara Love is needed for these children to get safely to and from school. No busses next year and 1400 houses in the neighborhood make for a hazardous situation for these kids. They need a safe route. It needs to be done before someone gets hurt. Better to be safe than sorry when someone ends up getting hurt
- Buses are not going to be available for elementary kids and the sidewalk is not wide enough to accommodate children walking next to busy road. I would like to either see a bridge which will connects the park over a creek to the school and or widening of the sidewalk

- to make more room which would narrow one section down to one lane of traffic towards the entrance of the school safer.
- * "I would love to have my children walk/ bike safely to and from school. With bus routes disappearing due to budget cuts, help from the city would be appreciated. Finally, the drivers in my area are uneducated about bike/ pedestrian safety. The police should be ticketing drivers at the following intersections and use the \$ collected to pay for improvements. Heritage Trace Parkway and General Worth, Heritage Trace Parkway and Dalton"
- Triver awareness is really one of the biggest issues I've seen here in Fort Worth. I moved here from New York City, and at least there, you knew that cars were expecting pedestrians. Here, I have to be super-aware and assume that the drivers don't see me at intersections, even if I have the right of way (such as on left turns).
- * All neighborhoods within the 820 loop should have sidewalks.
- Please give great consideration to Safe Routes to school for our elementary school. It is only a matter of time before a child is hurt. Our park does not a speed bump nor does it have a pedestrain crossing sign but there is a painted crosswalk. Children often cross here without any crossing guard and then pass through the creek there at the park because it is a direct line to the school without forcing them to travel to the frather end of the neighborhood to cross the narrow sidewalk the runs along the bridge. Twice I have been told of children being pushed off the bridge into traffic. The school district will not run busses for the elementary school next year therefore increasing foot traffic of our smallest of children trying to cross the narrow bridge an area that a large percentage of neighborhood traffic flow take this road to reach HWY 114. The park masterplan included a bridge to connect to the school but has never came to fruition.
- The bridge on Harriet Creek Drive is narrow and kids fall off their bikes and motorist do not stop to watch for them. This is an accident waiting to happen. Someone at FW City Council needs to take notice and do something before a child gets hurt. Please we beg of you to help us.
- "In addition to closing certain alleys on Magnolia I think the city needs to do a better job of alerting drivers to walkers in dense areas of the city. Magnolia Ave and West 7th really come to mind. I walk every day on Magnolia Ave and the un-awareness of pedestrians is very high. I would be more than happy to provide those dangerous

- areas. I will have been hit by a vehicle while jogging because the driver couldn't see me and I couldn't see them. I'm fine with cars at cross street because the intersections are big enough to see cars approaching but there are 4-5 blind alleys where it's impossible to see each other and it should just be blocked off to cars."
- I would probably walk more if I didn't ride my bicycle. There are plenty of people who can't ride a bike, so I want them to be able to get around by foot as well.
- † "I live on W. 7th and the improvements to sidewalks, intersections and lighting have welcomed me to travel more by foot. It makes my living experience that much greater. When I lived near TCU, the surrounding neighborhoods had awful lighting. I would not feel safe walking around at night because there are such large areas of darkness that cover the streets."
- more trails and places for recreation. beautiful city...let's get moving!
- * "PLEASE, PLEASE!! Look into the school route for children of the Harriet Creek Ranch Subdivision and Clara Love Elementary School in North Fort Worth. Our elementary age children must walk to school next year across a very busy traffic bridge with 4 lanes of cars and only 1 VERY thin sidewalk to get to school. Some kids ride their bikes which makes the situation even more dangerous! PLEASE build the pedestrian only bridge across Harriet Creek Ranch that was dropped due to budget cuts. Our school buses will be cut next year and our children have NO SAFE route to school nest year! PLEASE HELP US!!"
- † I love to walk in my neighborhood (off Forest Park near TCU) but it is frustrating to turn a corner and suddenly have no option but to walk in the street. Also, there are many places where the sidewalk suddenly buckles these are dangerous in the evening or early morning.
- Better lighting and sidewalks on the way down to Magnolia from Rosedale.
- Texas is unfortunately a very vehicle-centric state. Drivers do not appear to feel obligated to share the roadways with pedestrians or cyclyists. Some drastic improvements are underway to improve bike transportation. Some campaign or billboard to raise awareness of the movement in addition to street and sidewalk improvements would be helpful. If the city would subsidize local retailers/restaraunts to provide discounts and other incentives for

- those who walk/ride bikes to the establishes would not only motivate more people to walk but may also raise awareness that the city promotes that lifestyle.
- Whatever improvements are made need to be connected to each other and to existing pedestrian circulation routes. A pleasant (beautiful perhaps??), safe NETWORK needs to be the goal. Isolated elements will likely be underutilized. Make it ENJOYABLE to walk from one place to another, even if it IS 2 or 3 miles.
- * With the budget cuts for the school, my neighborhood is losing bus service. I have a 3rd grader and I'm not comfortable having her walk to and from school if she is crossing a bridge that cars use to get in and out of the neighborhood.
- † Improved walking access from the Southside to Downtown Fort Worth. Raised crosswalks on Lancaster would be a great help!
- * Bridge/walkway needed for Clara Love Elementary.
- The inner city neighborhoods are a mess. One property might have sidewalks, followed by two that don't, etc. Handicapped ramps are the same. At an intersection, I've seen ramps built that go into grass. I've also seen people in wheelchairs having to ride with cars in traffic just to get to a bus line. First the city needs to imporve their property, and second, come up with a plan that brings older neighborhoods up to code. Mayor mikey has long said sidewalks have been a top priority, but I haven't seen any real improvements."
- Mider sidewalks with barriers between the street and the sidewalks would do wonders (trees). Also, encouraging more patios that draw people to the sidewalks and showcase a vibrant city.
- † I don't feel safe walking, when drivers will turn right on red, and left on green, without looking to see if there's someone trying to walk across the street.
- † Harriet Creek Ranch Subdivision needs a bridge from Cowboy Trial to Clara Love School. Buses will no longer be provide for our children and they need a safe and direct way to get to school. The only way to walk to school now is on a very narrow sidewalk very close to a four lane street. This will not be safe for our 500+ children to get to and from school.
- † I appreciate the effort to make areas more walkable. I hope these efforts allow neighborhoods to become safer and reducing traffic as people are able to take advantage of their local businesses.

- † I'm very happy with the pedestrian, bike and retail improvements on Magnolia and have started to walk there from my house in Fairmount. Good work.
- * "Also need sidewalks along White Settlment Road, from Lindale all the way to Henderson. I forgot to mention this on the previous page. Need to emphasize continuity of sidewalks."
- * "Please stop adding speed bumps in our older neighborhoods. My neighborhood (unfortunately) already has many cars that park on both sides of the street since several older homes do not have garages. This alone is already a traffic-calming measure (effectively turning our street into a one-lane thoroughfare). Adding unattractive speed bumps further complicates driving on these already-narrow roads. Furthermore, they scrape up smaller cars (even at very slow speeds). When cars swerve to avoid the speed bumps (even dipping over near the gutter to avoid hitting the bump with their wheels), they make for a very dangerous pedestrian experience for people right there on the sidewalk. Also, please remind people not to block the sidewalk with their cars."
- * "For me improved walking is a necessity for a dense urban population, I see urban development going hand in hand with the need for pedestrian improvement. The areas that come to mind outside of school would be downtown, west 7th, and near southside. For my neighborhood tanglewood there is already decent access to the trails and parks, but limited access to TCU via sidewalks via Bellaire or the Trinity Trails / University Village via Colonial Parkway."
- Must have better infrastructure for walking and cycling in my area. Very unsafe with narrow roads, speed and aggression of drivers.
- (sundance square area, near southside, & cultural district) but they're still designed as only employment destinations, w/ streets & public transportation designed to bring people in from far away, and not as neighborhoods in of themselves. There's no easy way to get from one to the other without a car (a hassle for such a short distance). also, these areas are functionally separate islands of developments w/ everything centered on 1 street (main, magnolia, 7th) with nothing just a few blocks off it. i'd like to see a walkable connection between them so someone in one area (whether they live there, drove in for work, or visiting) can easily get to another node on foot. this can boost business in DT by increasing the

- volume of traffic (employ and resident) and also boost development along the corridor. When magnolia was fixed for pedestrians, more people started walking, and now look how many new things are opening up there.
- People in Fairmount are generally willing to walk, and there are destinations within walking distance, if only the sidewalks were in better shape. It's just wrong that I can't safely walk my son around the block or to the park and school that are only a few blocks away. The city should focus on neighborhoods where the addition of sidewalks would make the most difference, and I think that Fairmount is that place. Fort Worth already has some really nice pieces in place (downtown, West 7th, street lights, bike lanes, Oleander, Magnolia, the new urban villages), but we need sidewalks to link those things together and make them work.
- Again a huge pedestrian plaza w/ a huge fountain
- Robinwood in Carter-Riverside. There are so many children who walk to school as well as adults who walk for exercise. Even though we have speed bumps, there are way too many cars speeding through our neighborhood to make it safe walking on the street. It would also be great to create walking trails out to Trinity Trails. I'm not a bike rider so I'm looking for a safe way to walk to some nature. And again, please create wide sidewalks in any kind of commercial district. My husband and I just visited the Highlands in Arlington. What could be a cool, walkable, entertainment/retail experience feels like an upgraded strip mall. The sidewalks are just way too small to feel comfortable and to create an urban feel. I used to live in NYC and wide sidewalks, for whatever reason, encourage people to use them. And they can always be used for restaurant patio seating, street fairs, etc.
- * "Quality walk ways are successful only if they serve the right environment. It is as much about changing the urban form and ecouraging urban village style development as it is about improving sidewalks. Sidewalks won't do any good if all destinations are 10 miles apart. Proximity of basic services is key."
- There is significant lacking in Ft. Worth's pedestrian connectivity. Most neighborhoods are isolated islands in a sea of roadways. Connecting neighboorhoods could provide substantial benefits for all.

- Harriet Creek Ranch Subdivision has its own elementary school Clara Love there is only one bridge that bikers and walkers use to get to and from school. This bridge is the main front entrance to the subdivision and the sidewalk is narrow and dangerous for school age children riding and walking. We are in need of an additional bridge to lessen the congestion of kids that are walking and riding across the bridge especially starting next school year, because bus transportation will no longer be provided for our subdivision which means a huge increase in car riders, walkers and bike riders.
- Too many people violate the school zones. 630 children from Clara Love will have no bus transportation due to budget cuts at NISD. These little children ranging from 5 yrs to 9 yrs, will be riding bikes & walking to school. I am terrified a child will get seriously hurt or worse if we do not get a bridge. We need to find & provide safety for our children. Please be advise we have child molesters IN the neighborhood.. The wooded lot behind the park is where most boys walk across to cut their way to school. They walk across the rocks in the creek. Please, please provide safety for our little, innocent children.."
- Again, would really like to see a bridge built across Harriet Creek for our childrens safety going to and from school
- ★ More sidewalk!
- My kids attend Clara Love Elementary. Next year bus service is being cut due to budget deficiencies. There currently is only one way for our kids to walk or ride their bikes to school. The sidewalk crosses a bridge. It is a narrow area and the sidewalk butts right up to the street. Only one bike can fit on the sidewalk. If the children are not cautious and courteous of each other at ALL times, it is very likely that a child will end up in the road where cars are passing by. Right now not very many kids walk or ride to school, but when the number rises out of necessity next year, this will become more perilous than it already is! We have tried to voice our concerns, but so far have not heard any resolutions to make this area safer...or just plain SAFE for our children. Please don't ignore this issue until someone is killed. Come and look at the bridge for yourself. Walk on it in the morning when traffic is heavy. Clara Love Elementary, Justin, TX. Thanks in advance!
- * Our children need a safer way to/from Clara Love. The sidewalk on the street bridge is to narrow. I'm always afraid that a student will fall and be hit by oncoming traffic.

- I love Fort Worth, but I am very disappointed in the pedestrian facilities currently in place. I live near Camp Bowie Blvd. and it is extremely unsafe to cross Camp Bowie. There are shops on both sides of the street, but I have take a car just to get to the other side of the street. All along Camp Bowie to downtown, the sidewalks are terrible. At some places they just end or are covered with parking. Nobody walks in Fort Worth because it's not safe to walk, not because people don't want to walk.
- People will walk if the infrastructure encourages them to do so. This, along with public transportation, is a hyper critical issue facing Fort Worth as we continue to grow. I love this city but perhaps its greatest flaw is its culture of stubborness when it comes to progress with public transportation and pedestrian friendly development outside of downtown. New sidewalks and improved infrastructure can mitigate the negative effects of our city's sprawl. But, a continued and targeted commitment to the urban village iniative is what will encourage people to get out of their cars. Thanks for the opportunity to express my opinion.
- Most pedestrian crossing are ignored by drivers. Drivers are used to not yielding to pedestrians on designated cross walks because the speed limit is set too high or there are not enough markers to indicate that they need to stop.
- * "Roads where moving as many autos as fast as possible are very unfriendly to pedestrians. Safe access to transit is very important for pedestrians."
- ★ School buses have been cancelled for the 2011-2012 school year for Clara Love elementary and the road to the school is unsafe and not wide enough for the children. There is a creek between Harriet creek ranch and clara love and we need a bridge at the intersection of Ramada trail and cowboy trail to cross over for the kids to get to the school safely.
- Create a marked network of pedestrian routes that have fully accessible sidewalks and crossings along their entire length and that connect important governmental, educational, medical, recreational, and commercial destinations. Add pedestrian signage indicating direction and distance to trains stations, the ITC, Trinity Trails, museums, parks, other landmarks. Add signage (throughout the city) featuring large, easy-to-read local street maps and lists of nearby destinations. Extend the duration of walk lights at larger intersections. Place artwork, historic markers, fountains, well-

- designed and appealing street furniture (benches, light fixtures, and trash receptacles), seasonal plantings, and shade trees along sidewalks throughout the city. Place public recycling bins along sidewalks in commercial districts. Require property owners to keep sidewalks clear, intact, and free from low hanging branches. Increase the number of well-regulated food carts (with adequate trash receptacles).
- ★ Japan hS raised crosswalks where all traffic must stop. No turns on red. We can do this in some of our Urban Villages and neAr schools. Southside and 7th street for start. Start in urban areas that can connect to trinity trail
- * Our children are bussed right now to Clara Love Elementry. But now budgets have been reduced and there will be no bus service next year. For the safety of our children in the harriett Creek subdivision we need a bridge over the creek to the elementry. For them to walk down Harriett Creek drive is not safe and is not a good route for most children living in the neighborhood.
- Fort Worth needs to make sure that sidewalks are built when new neighborhoods are there is no reason that the city should have to come back and make a mess putting them in 5 or 10 years later. Also, the city needs to acknowledge that part of the process of enhancing the walking experience is ensuring that there are destinations to walk TO such as stores and parks that aren't a mile away.
- † The main problem with walkability is all the parking lots and car infrastructure that is treacherous to cross, and yet we are building more of it. Density and streetcars will promote walking and be good for everyone.
- * more sidewalks are always great.
- † I like West 7th but getting from Montgomery Plaza to the other bars in the area is almost impossible the streets are wide, traffic is moving fast and the sidewalks are narrow. Please please please do something about this area there's so much unused potential here! It would be such a pedestrian-friendly environment if you guys just calmed the traffic a bit and made enhanced crosswalks from the north to south side of West 7th.
- ★ Sidewalks invite pedestrian activity. Fort Worth makes it convenient to drive, not to walk. We need to reverse this. A major problem here is the lack of connectivity. Sidewalks run for a few blocks and then suddenly disappear.

- Pedestrian bridge over creek needs to be completed, connecting Harriet Creek neighborhood with Clara Love Elementary school, especially with school bus service being discontinued starting next year due to education budget constraints. The only option currently is for children/students to cross over narrow sidewalk next to busy vehicle bridge on Harriet Creek Dr. The safety of our children is at risk.
- Much of the population of Ft Worth lies in the "urban sprawl." I would very much like to give up a car and either walk or bicycle to my destinations, but this would only be possible if Ft Worth had passenger rail and/or street cars that would connect the major housing areas to the major attractions (downtown, cultural district, stockyards), and also to major employers, including Lockheed Martin on the west side.
- City needs to build out sidewalks on major and minor arterials, instead of depending on developers to do so. Depending on developers, leads to no sidewalks along vacant lots or inadequate sidewalks. Sidewalks encourage walking, as it makes the activity near all weather and safer.
- More mixed-use zoning would encourage neighborhood growth around walking by giving a smaller town feel and neighborhood destinations other than convenience stores. Traffic calming with narrower roads, more trees along roads, and more frequent crosswalk (as well as strict enforcement of crosswalk pedestrian rights) would also help.
- * "I've been in contact with our councilman, the parks dept, Harriet Creek HOA and Clara Love PTA. I'm pretty sure we are more than willing to do whatever it takes to make our kids safe on their way to school!!! Thanks for allowing our input, please keep us informed. COMMUNICATION is the key to getting this done."
- † I would also like to see sidewalks installed along the north frontage road of I-30 from Beach to 820.
- Look in to conexting to bike paths with additional sidewalk from the neihborhoods.
- * "I don't feel like most drivers know the law to yield to pedestrians in a cross-walk. Far too often, cars do not yield to runners trying to cross the street. They do not have the right-of-way and are dangerous to the peds. The other issue is stop lines. Drivers in the area have a problem with stopping too close to the intersections and not leaving adequate space for a walker or runner to cross

- safely. Ref:

 "Shelter from traffic (or traffic calming) is the most important pedestrian issue in Fort Worth. While I don't feel unsafe walking, it is VERY unpleasant to be mere feet from high speed traffic, noisy cars, buses, etc. I think greenery around walkways and dedicated sidewalks set back from the street are great ideas. Another smaller issue is shade (again, trees would help dramatically)."
- * Many bus stops have no sidewalk leading up to them. If a person who does not typically use the bus wanted to catch one it would be hard to figure which one to take because maps of that route should be on the sign.
- "The bridge on Harriet Creek Drive is utilized by Clara Love Elemenatry students walking or riding their bicycles to and from school. Vehicles driving on outside lanes of the bridge are extremely close to the sidewalk leaving no room to avoid a child if they were to step off or ride their bicycle off of the narrow sidewalk. This is the only route available for walking and bicycle riding elementary students. Considering the proposed deletion of bus routes within Harriet Creek Ranch neighborhood in 2012, an increase in walking / bicycle riding students is expected. This will obviously increase the likelihood of a child being injured while crossing the bridge unless a safer alternative is provided. Additionally, the interesection of HWY 114 & Harriet Creek Drive poses a significant risk to the middle school and high school students walking to and from school. Although they are crossing at an intersection, students are crossing a very busy highway with speeds in excess of 60mph."
- Maintain the pedestrian underpasses, espec. @ Henderson & Jennings. All underpasses need working lights, more frequent cleaning, & better maintainence so they are inviting rather than scary to walk through. (Art on the walls would be a plus); Too many sidewalks narrow down and end in trafficy roads, on ramps, or walls. Eliminate these dead ends & add a functional sidewalk that does not require backtracking; Require road crews not to block sidewalks with temporary traffic signs; Move utility poles that are in the middle of sidewalks; Remove the need for pedestrians to use a button to request cross lights (make it automatic for there to be a walk lights at all intersections. Cars don't need to file a request for green lights!); Improve the lack of sidewalks/intermittent sidewalks.

- † "1. Don't seclude walking areas...keep them visible for safety and to draw people in to the action. 2. And try to keep trees out of the pedestrian right of way...it is very difficult to walk as a group in many areas of downtown because of the trees. I love shade, I love the beauty of trees, but they really hog the pedestrian walkways and often you have to proceed single file to destinations. 3. Narrow streets, wider walkways...duh! Discourage auto traffic in dense areas. 4. It would be neat to have a pedestrian walkway similar to the Las Ramblas in Barcelona...over a mile of street vendors, performance art...started in river bed...TRV???"
- The common concern with most walking facilities is that they don't connect places very well. They don't encourage pedestrian mobility in a way that allows people to choose to walk to a destination rather than take a car. Short term this plan should focus on high priority projects that are most likely to get people out of their cars by connecting places in close proximity to each other. The pedestrian space in between should be pleasant, easy to use, and at least, as efficient as using a car to move from place to place.
- we need a bridge across the field and park area to the school in Harriet Creek Ranch addition to keep children from having to walk in fields where safety from snakes, etc exits
- "Give tickets to cars parked blocking sidewalks (start with warnings). Public awareness campaign that cars must yield to pedestrians in crosswalks in Texas (most people honestly do not know this). encourage street tree planting along sidewalks. THANK YOU FOR MAKING THIS A PRIORITY!"
- Walkability must be addressed at the onset of every new development within the city. Building setbacks and vehicle parking seem to be two areas which, when planned with pedestrian activity in mind, could significantly increase the walkability of Fort Worth. Also, with concepts such as bike sharing being considered in our city, more pedestrian activity is likely in the near future, especially in the central city. More walkability increases the quality of life and health of citizenry and needs to be addressed. Thank you for your attention!
- Too many to mention. Will address them at public forums or directly to city staff. I hope part of this process will include traffic calming strategies w/o resorting to speed humps (not to be confused with raised crosswalks, which I like). Mini round abouts, real roundabouts, 2-way streets from one-way, aggressive

- signalization of crosswalks, driver education about pedestrian rights in crosswalks...
- † "I don't think that there is too much wrong with the facilities for pedestrians throughout the city. Many areas have sidewalks and the crosswalks, although sometimes a bit unnerving, are sufficient for crossing a street. To me the bigger problem for pedestrians is that walking in Fort Worth is visually and physically not appealing. Walking on a sidewalk works fine, but it is not very appealing when the sun is reflecting light off of the hot concrete into your face and cars are noisily passing you from behind at 40 mph. When you get to the destination there is usually a large parking lot between the sidewalk and the front door. Walking through a maze of cars driving backwards just does not seem very safe. Maybe trees along the sidewalk and zoning that requires buildings to be at the sidewalk instead of behind a parking lot would help. There are also very few destinations within walking distance to many neighborhoods and the population density does not exist to support more amenities."
- Need better crossing on 7th st
- * "Forgot one from previous page: The pedestrian infrastructure at the intersection of Lovell/Vickery & Montgomery is inexcusably subpar considering the amount of restaurants and businesses within walking distance to each other: various antique shops, Flying Fish, Railhead Smokehouse, Cabbage Rose, Dishes from the Past, Mitzi's, etc...This area has a lot of potential for pedestrian activity!"
- † I've found that the major problem with walking places isn't lack of sidewalks (I'm very mobile, but this is definitely a problem for those with disabilities). It is lack of attention/caring from drivers. I'll frequently have to wait for cars to turn even though I have a crossing sign/right of way simply because they don't look to see if there are pedestrians. Education is critical, in addition to infastructure improvements.
- † Pedestrian traffic would improve if there were accessible rail that could whisk me away to many different locations around town, including work.
- * Better maintainance and wider sidewalks.
- "We need permanent public restrooms in our city parks especially parks like the one by the YMCA on Beach that's a hub for sports activities or at Gateway Park and Marion Sansom Park where people go to run, hike and bike. Maybe some city organized activities in the parks too to help people see what these facilities have to offer the

- community and to talk more pride in them and help drive away the undesirable element which has kept the residents away."
- I very thankful to live in a city that cares for its pedestrians. Thank you so much! Can someone please look into the Courtright Drive, I see so many almost accidents when I walk over there and once in a while childern who almost get hit by blind spots in the road.
- ★ Thanks!
- † I agree with this project. Let's get off our butts and do more walking.
- † I appreciate this survey and what it means for Fort Worth development.
- PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION! We are forced to use our cars in this city, except for the few small areas that are walkable. But even in those areas, you have to drive and park your car so you can walk. Street cars and a better bus system will promote walking in the major areas of the city. Public transport would not only promote walking, it would also improve the environment as well as the economy. Another major problem with the walkability of FW is that many of the major shopping areas are too dangerous to walk in. Our city is designed for cars. Residents are craving something different. Look at how fast the Magnolia area has grown.
- ★ Some planning and zoning to limit the distances from living areas to shipping areas would be nice. Try planning the living density to prevent overcrowding on roads in the first place would be nice, too.
- † I mainly walk in heritage community because I know it is safe and the walking trails are great.
- * Need walking trails far west side
- I walk everyday for exercise. We travel to New York, Washington and other major cities frequently. We walk everywhere. It would not be unusual for our whole family of 4 (children 13 & 15) to walk 10 miles a day around those tows just going from place to place. We can never walk anywhere in Ft Worth as a family to get to shopping, eating, or schools. Ft Worth is beautiful and should take advantage of walkers that would walk to shopping, eating, and entertainment places no matter the distance if it was safe and possible.
- † "If the bus system was more robust and or if we had light rail it would make it easier to walk further with the help on mass transit. I have walked from Monticello to downtown Fort Worth or to Target. I do a lot of work for TCU and I would love to be able to take mass

- transit and walk to and from transit stops. 5th Street between University Dr. & Carroll Street is horrible to walk or drive. (I didn't think of this earlier.)"
- † Provide more safety for the kids from the Harriet Creek Ranch to Clara Love Elementary.
- * Fort Worth has such a beautiful walking area along the Trinity River but often hard to walk there due to traffic limitations. I would love to see you enhance the areas getting to the Trinity so that pedestrians are safely arriving at the great Fort Worth attraction.
- frowth in FT Worth is crazy and the roadways are not sufficient to accomodate the growth. The city needs to look at traffic patterns and improve, widen, build streets to ease the flow of traffic in several areas. Stop the building. Stop the greed with the building codes...11' between houses is ridiculous! Greed is making this a horrible place to live!!!
- † I truly appreciate the Trinity River Trails downtown. Beautiful, well done! In general, I suggest any improvements to sidewalks or paths should be large enough to accommodate pedestrians and bicyclists. Would like to see restroom facilities near trailheads and parks.
- † Texas needs to teach peds that they need to be more careful when walking I am constantly amazed at how peds arrogantly walk out in front of cars without looking at all. Very dangerous!!!! Peds need some safety education.
- Lets make FW truly green by adding more walking/biking paths to enjoy nature and our community
- * "I see signs all over our areas that say ""Share the Road with Bikes"". Well, bikes and cars are not sharing the road with walkers. Our city offers wonderful opportunities for walkers if we can only feel safe and relaxed. Thank you for this survey."
- * need stronger enforcement policies to help pedestrians
- ★ Better/more lighting would be helpful.
- "In regards to walking in Fort Worth, nothing is in walking distance. Some streets don't have any sidewalks to walk on, so you're forced to walk on the grass or on the side of the road, which to some people, it might render them as they will be scared to get hit. Some streets don't have sufficient lighting outside making it very scary to walk at night, especially if it is already in a ""bad"" part of town. (ie Rosedale/Lancaster). Some parts of streets are also not kept up with, trash everywhere."

- * "Signage: ""Pedestrian Area"" for the W7th St/museum area.

 Commuters have sped through on University to short cut on Bailey & Arch Adams to White Settlement for years at high speeds. Goals to create ""Pedestrian Friendly"" areas have to include planning for ""Caution"" all along the feeding arterials. I appreciate the efforts already in place for river access improvements and many green belts connectors, as well as bus access city wide. TRE is a delight for DFW access, but needs better connecting buses, or direct rail into W 7th and other key locations. Finally, a safe-feeling walk for me does not include one where wide-angle mirrors of trucks speeding by could wipe me out. A buffering edge then a wide sidewalk makes breathing figuratively & literally safer. Bus stop benches should not be positioned so that humans are force-fed the exhaust emissions from vehicles at stop lights at major intersections, especially in medical office/hospital areas. Thank you for this opportunity."
- † The problem is less with the actual facilities and access but more with the attitude and environment of people not viewing the pedestrian travel as a viable option. Possibly creating tree lined sidewalk and path areas to entice citizens into using walking as a healthy option for a mode of transportation.
- † "I moved to the Monticello neighborhood five years ago to be able to walk to the nearby stores, services, restaurants, etc. I have lost over 30 pounds by incorporating walking into my daily life. Often I park my car on Friday afternoon and don't use it until Monday morning. Fort Worth does not have a pedestrian culture. People in cars tend to ignore the pedestrian as the one who has to yield. Fort Worth neighborhoods do not have enough sidewalks. Many of the sidewalks that do exist are not maintained or are made impassable by vegitation or by vehicles parked across them. Many have mud from lack of ground cover or are uneven due to tree roots. Fort Worth needs to pick areas such as those west and south of downtown and focus its efforts to build a true walking culture supplemented by frequent, convenient, reliable public transportation."
- There needs to be added emphasis to the construction of new sidewalks and the upkeep/maintenance of existing sidewalks.
- † "Poor, crumbling sidewalks in the Monticello area could be improved. I think something should be done to connect the Fort Worth South area to downtown, which would further improve the

- Lancaster Avenue area. Something like what they are doing in Dallas with The Park connecting Uptown and the Arts District."
- Truly, the heat (and distance) prevents us from walking to more closeby destinations than anything else. But better-defined crosswalks would make Camp Bowie businesses easier to get to. Prevost & Camp Bowie is another such intersection. We enjoy the Trinity Trail on weekends."
- More needs to be done to improve walking and biking and public transportation in Fort Worth. we are too car dependent.
- * From what I've noticed, for the most part, and some of the travels to other cities, Fort Worth has improved, but still has some improvements it could make especially on the northside area.
- the 3 intersections I mentioned are VERY dangerous and I have almost been hit by a car at all 3
- "wider sidewalks in high pedestrian traffic zones, international style crosswalks (people cannot see the typical ones around town). public service messages/announcements telling people that cars must stop at crosswalks. People do not know that is the law."
- † Improving pedestrian and bicycle safety will go far to the improvement of Fort Worth. Thank you for this survey and the implementation of it's results.
- 7th street corridor needs sidewalk improvements
- PLEASE make pedestrian walkways, bike paths, and public transportation a priority. It's so easy to get fat and unhealthy in Fort Worth, and it's incredibly difficult to to enjoy being outside here, unless you're exercising on the trails. If we didn't feel like we were taking our lives into our hands when we walked out of our front doors, many of us here in Fort Worth would LOVE to walk our small errands.
- * make the new South 7th area more pedestrian accessible from the museums and the Will Rogers Center
- † I am pleased to see walkable, bikeable areas popping up, but I think it would be nice to have a connectable route between popular areas (downtown to Fairmount to West 7th corridor).
- Connecting major recreational walking trails would encourage more people to walk/bike farther distances. I.E. connecting the Park Glen, Arcadia Park, Heritage, Crawford Farms neighborhood trail systems would lead to miles of connected trail from Basswood Blvd. to 1709.
- * "Sidewalks on University by Botanic Gardens, from Harley to I-30, especially now that the entrance at Harley is closed into Botanic

- Gardens....It would be nice for groups/volunteers to adopt areas of sidewalks/streets to keep them clean... especially the tourist areas."
- The East side of Fort Worth has been extremely neglected as far as consideration for pedestrians, for both adults and children. We need more sidewalks, crossing signals and police watching over the pedestrian safety.
- Look to Irvine, Trabuco Canyon and Rancho Santa Margarita, all in California for master planning information. They all have it down!
- * Any improvements for walking will be beneficial.
- I am very excited that you are working to make Fort Worth more pedestrian friendly! We can all benefit so much from this! I can't wait to see what changes are made for the City of Fort Worth!
- † "The 7th street area is much improved. It would help to have more time to walk across at the 5 corners intersection. Maybe signs reminding drivers that there are pedestrians would help to get them to pay more attention."
- * would like easier access to trinity river from hulen and vickery area. would like sidewalks along one side of hulen. bellaire and north.
- † "I prefer to walk through neighborhoods. The most pleasant areas often have no sidewalks at all. I assume they don't WANT pedestrians in their neighborhoods, which is both sad and elitist."
- * "Need repair of current sidewalks as they are uneven. Need to police patrol on Trinity Trails as there are homeless people living under the overpasses and asleep on park benches. Please help to relocate these people. Need to remove graffiti painted on walls under overpasses on Trinity Trails. Add security phones on the Trinity Trail to alert 911 as needed. Improve walkways in the Medical District."
- Add sidewalks to all new neighborhoods as well as adding sidewalks to existing neighborhoods that don't currently have them.
- * "Please improve the intersection at Berry and University. I enjoy walking my daughter in her stroller around this area but crossing this intersection is terrible. The roads are in horrible shape and the medians are tiny. Pedestrian flashers would be nice through TCU, too. Lastly, speed bumps or more police presence would be nice along Berry/Bellaire between University and Bellaire Dr.(near the TCU track). The speed limit is 35 but people drive much faster. I have been walking and seen someone lose control around a curve and nearly hit a walker. So scary. Especially because I walk with my daughter along this route daily."

- Fort Worth is a great place to walk. I do it at least once a week.
- Trinity Trails offers more opportunity for pedesterians to walk recreationally than is common in most cities, which is great. But the combination of poor public transportation system within Ft. Worth, harrassing panhandlers, and the distribution of shopping areas make it awkward to get around to do errands. I drive in Ft. Worth to do errands whereas when we lived in Dallas, I often walked, took the light rail. My husband takes the TRE to work and in the past we had a habit of walking and taking public transportation when we could. Living on the Eastside, we feel stranded and very reliant on our car to do anything. Oakland and Randol Mill on the north side of I-30 where we live is heavily trafficked by tankers and gravel trucks. Not pedestrian friendly out of our neighborhood.
- * Flashing lights on the ground in crosswalks would be a great addition especially near schools.
- Driver awareness is paramount to ensuring pedestrian safety. I have had many close calls when I have had the right-of-way due to driver inattentiveness, left turn on red one way street to one way street, drivers not checking for pedestrian traffic, wrong way driver on one way street, etc.
- * Would like to see elevated ped walkways connecting parks, i.e. over University Dr connecting the Botanic Gardens to Trinity Park,
- I would love to see the development and use of greenbelts wherever possible, for connecting neighborhoods to parks, retail/offices, etc.
- † I know from working in local government for 13 years that some citizens don't want sidewalks put in because they don't want people walking in front of their homes. I believe that the City needs to determine where sidewalk safety takes precedence, not individual homeowners.
- the traffic congestion in neighborhoods are the main problem when walking in fort worth.
- Iights on some of the walking trails in Heritage development would be nice. Don't feel safe to walk there (or anywhere) at night without lights.
- Fort Worth has generally done a horrible job promoting walking (or biking) anywhere. To have major thoroughfares without sidewalks, even where recent development could have been required to incur the cost is inexcusable. I also know of one location along Fossil Creek Bouldevard where the developer put the sidewalk in, and the

- wheelchair ramp, but never linked the two, and the City apparently never said a word.
- "North East Fort Worh is not good at all. Roads are not adequate for driving, walking or cycling. The city of Fort Worth desperately needs to address these issues."
- Drivers don't understand to park behind the line and block the crosswalk all the time. Not sure really what the solution is for that.
- Provide free parking at entrances to downtown Trinity Trails to encourage more walking and use of trails. Optimize the parking at the downtown trinity trails. Provide mile markers on the trails.
- Because we are in a newer area it is getting more populated every year, especially with younger children, I think the addition of sidewalks in the more mature neighborhoods would be a great benefit. The kids don't have anywhere to walk without being in the road and it is a hazard for them and for drivers. With all the two lane roads with ditches on either side the kids only have sidewalks in the new subdivisions and it is not a possibility to send the kids to school on their bikes or even walk without putting them in harm. Also, because it is a more remote area people drive way to fast because the speed limit is not enforced.
- ★ Downtown, intersections often don't allow sufficient time to cross the intersection.
- * "Pedestrian issues are most important for neighborhoods where people can walk to shopping and recreational areas, or have to walk due to inadequate public transportation. The City has to find ways to cut down on traffic around schools. This may be a child safety issue rather than a walking issue."
- † Thanks for the survey! It's encourageing to be heard!
- * "After moving to Fort Worth, I was able to eliminate one car because we can walk to our bank, post office, cleaners, barber shop, other shops, restaurants and all the museums. But, Fort Worth is still so tied to the automobile that it makes walking and jogging a dangerous undertaking. Thank you for this survey, I hope it leads to a safer and more pleasant environment for pedestrians."
- Weather is a major factor, as is the development pattern which is very automobile dependent. Short trips between neighborhoods and shops, trails, parks, etc should be a major priority to link Ft Worth and provide some non-automobile options for those who are willing to use them. Those connections should include safety amenities such as lighting. Providing paths wide enough to

- accommodate bikes and pedestrians would be wise, because they will co-exist and narrow paths are a hinderance to their usage.
- More speed deterent devices are needed in the sendera ranch subdivision. Due to budget cuts the bus transportation has been changed. More children will be walking to school in the fall. However, the sidewalks are incomplete on almost every street to get to Sendera Ranch Elementary and the New Elementary School that will open in the fall. Children will be walking in the street in several locations to get to school.
- ★ Public restrooms
- You've created the expectation that my area of town will soon have sidewalks everywhere because last summer you built the curb-cut ramps all over the place. It seems a real waste of money to put a curb-cut ramp where no one now walks and where no sidewalk will be built. What's up with all these ramps and no sidewalks?
- * "Neighborhood sidewalks in older neighborhoods must be repaired. The sidewalks in many areas are degraded to a point where it is hazardous to walk, and people pushing strollers or using wheel chairs are now using the street. Existing city code (Article 1 General, Section 30-1)requires the homeowner to maintain the sidewalk. This should be enforced. A cost sharing program could be developed in which the City pays for a percentage of the replacement with the remainder paid for by the homeowner."
- fort worth is a beutiful city but is acouple areas that need attention like on Trails of Marine Creek is a few acres for a small park for the last 5 years and nothing has being done about it.
- I think improving and increasing the number of safe, comfortable sidewalks would do wonders for our health and pocketbook. It would be similar to the front porches we use to have in that it would encourage people to get out, say hello to their neighbors, and get to know who your neighbors are.
- All is great on the Trail by Tanglewood Park, but on the trail by the Trinity River between Overton Park West and all the way to Bryant Irvin, there need to be quite a few trashcans for water bottles, etc.
- The crosswalk at 7th and Carrol runs on an angle and is not safe at all! The Walk signall only comes on for maybe 10 seconds and due to the angle of the crosswalk drivers turning onto 7th dont see you crossing We have almost been hit several times while out walking with our baby!! Due to the amount of traffic on 7th and the amont

- of people crossing the street on Weekends at night there really needs to be a bridge!"
- Surprises me that in TX a road could be built without a sidewalk....
 Where I grew up, a sidewalk is automatically built when a new road goes up.
- City needs bike lanes, needs crossings and needs drivers to pay attention. Too many drivers roll through intersections on right turns. I am almost hit about once a week because of this. They just look to their left and roll right. One of these days, they'll hit someone.
- † Thank you for even considering this, I'm proud of Fort Worth. :D
- † I think the parks are great but with gas prices sometimes you wish to walk around your neighborhood. Being on meadowbrook dr there are manytimes there are no sidewalks or pedestrian crosswalk to use... with the drivers on the road not following the speed limit most of the time it can be rather dangerous.
- Any sidewalks would be helpful where ever they may be added. This provides a safe place to walk away from traffic.
- We need more walkability on the far west side. (820 and Camp Bowie). Our neighborhood has no sidewalks at all (Linda Vista Estates), and there are no parks within walking distance.
- Sidewalks have definitely improved but still a few locations could use more improvement or attention. Downtown and Lancaster corridor are great. Southside has improved. On occasion it seems crosswalks do not allow enough time for pedestrians to cross. Most noticeably is the one at 7th and Carrol
- **★** More portolets
- As always, pedestrians are at risk from drivers running stop lights. And there is always the chance of being the target of nesting birds at night in the dowtown area.
- Additional plans for bike lanes along side the new sidewalks for pedestrians would further encourage healthy lifestyles in Fort Worth.
- The new crosswalk signs with visual timed countdowns (like the ones along University and at Throckmorton/9th St.) are very helpful.
- Crosswalk signals need to work for pedestrians as well as autos. School crossings need to be policed - kids cross against the traffic, causing traffic backups, pedestrians and drivers need to be ticketed more regularly for infractions.

- * "Neighborhood is safe to walk. Not along Bridge Street Noland Catholic High School run in our neighborhood. A sidewalk would make it easier for them to enter our neighborhood."
- future walkways and bike trails might use power line right of way trails.
- Stop signs are needed in sendera ranch, NWISD will no longer bus students next year and we can't even get stop signs for the t-intersections, no one stops at them they don't even look. What will happen next year when all the children have to walk?
- We as a family love to walk. Providing safe sidewalks would enable families with young children and teens to able to walk when possible when doing errands or just hanging out with friends. Being able to walk around your community safely provides the exercise our children need while limiting vehicle usage. Being ale to walk places ties the community together by having face to face interaction with neighbors and limiting interaction through our fast paced, technological world. Walking trails are healthy, eco friendly and tie us to the outside world in its natural state.
- most streets do not have smooth sidewalks and many residents either park into the sidewalk or close it off with their gate opening into the sidewalk. As a pedestrian most of the bus stops do not have shelter(from weather or lights at night) or even a sidewalk to wait (benches) for the bus it is just a small sign in a lot.
- ★ Terrible walking conditions in this area of town. To make matters worse, no public transportation because the "T" refuses to drive thru the city of Lake Worth to my neighborhood. If Boat Club Road had sidewalks, I could walk to the nearest bus stop.
- † This is a very difficult city to walk in, which hurts tourism.
- Any modifications to public transit, walking/bike paths, and/or bike lanes is greatly appreciated.
- ★ Trees for shade for summer walking would be nice.
- † "I seems simple to me. If you want folks to walk, you have to provide sidewalks. It is not safe or comfortable to walk in the street. I think any new home developments in the the city limits must be required to provide sidewalk everywhere in the new neighborhood. Sidewalks=walking and biking citizens"
- † "Lily b Clayton needs to be connected to Newby Park. People and their children walk into the street here. Parents who try to walk their children to school are met with high speeds on Forest Park blvd and try to come up Jerome but there are often speeders here

- to but the families are forced into the street this is absurd and needs to be rectified. Also, there is no reasonable plan for the 2100 Morphy block and the 2100 Harrison and 2100 W magnolia block this area is really crazy. It seems if you know the right people in Fort Worth you can do whatever you want, with no plan for anything, and total disregard for the future. Fort Worth needs to create and shade its sidewalks and start using permeable concrete where possible to reduce heat island affect. You would have a lot of people walking to University to Trinity Park if there was a viable way there from Mistletoe Heights. We need to put more trees along sidewalks and be sure to care for the sidewalks we already have."
- † "I think this is a commendable initiative to encourage people to walk or run in their neighborhoods. There would be a positive impact in their lives, health and security in the neighborhhods were this improvements can be implemented"
- with rising Gas prices I wouldn't mind taking an alternative to work. The only problem is that without sidewalks or bus service between Sendera Ranch and Alliance the alternatives are limited.
- * "Neighbor hood sidewalks, repair and add new sidewalks where none exist. Sidewalks to walk to school. Sidewalks to newby park lights, traffic speed bumps increased. Police watching and ticketing in problem area, like Jerome and mistletoe blvd. I live there, sometimes it is impossible to get out of your own driveway. The traffic is stacked up from the hospital to the red lite on forest park. These peole are rushing home, and use mistletoe and even magnolia as an alternate to Rosedale."
- Fort Worth has no recreation facilities near the Sendera Ranch subdivison to walk to.
- I walk my dogs around the Lake Como area and the park at Eldridge & Donnelly where there are no sidewalks. Walking in the street is nerve wracking and at night not safe at all.
- * "I am a pretty serious walker and will walk anywhere and everywhere, if given enough time and if there's adequate walking access. Overall, I'm very pleased to be able to walk to so many places in Fort Worth. I live near the Fort Worth Zoo and use the Trinity Trails to access other areas of town, such as the Cultural District and Downtown. However, the neighborhoods of Berkeley and Mistletoe Heights experience dangerous pedestrian situations due to the high traffic volume on Forest Park. There are several destinations in this area that are popular with people of all ages,

- especially children: Lily B. Clayton, Fort Worth Zoo, Tillery Park, Newby Park, and Trinity Park. Crossing Forest Park Boulevard to access these places is frequently perilous. (The area is also popular with cyclists, too, and they encounter many similar problems.)"
- "Our typical suburban neighborhoods are not set up to encourage walking too far. However we do have a city park very close to our neighborhood that we love walking in great walking sidewalks and a lot of people use them. I have walked to the community center before and there is a gas station fairly close that I drop my car off for service and walk home (sidewalk is not continuous but once in our neighborhood streets are wide enough that I feel safe). I do bike fairly frequently but I noticed on my last trip to the community center that there was not a bike rack there. I see there is a campaign to be watchful of motorcyclists I think a campaign to be watchful for pedistrians and cyclists would help increase safety while using alternative forms of transportaion. Thanks."
- I am very pleased with the pedestrian improvements near West 7th Street. This issue is very important to me as a resident of Montgomery Plaza. Please continue to focus on improving walkability near the urban villages and creating connectivity in neighborhoods. Pedestrian facilities, both for walking and cycling, are essential for connecting people to neighborhoods, businesses, and recreational opportunities. All of these are needed to maintain Fort Worth's quality of life and a strong economy.
- Please build a sidewalk on Old Denton Rd just north of Heritage Trace Pkwy. There is sidewalk north of this area and south of it. But its not finished between the two. It prohibits children from Heritage, Sunset Hills and Crawford Farms from walking to Bette Perot Elementary. I have seen older kids trying to ride their bikes along this corridor. This is very scary to see. It is a big hill with very uneven landscape. Because it is so difficult to ride through the grass kids risk riding on this two lane road that has a speed limit of 45mph. This is a tragedy waiting to happen. Old Denton is extremely dangerous and this area needs to be finished. It would also allow families to walk to the new Kroger and other Alliance shops if there was a sidewalk.
- We have lived here for almost 8 years and hope to retire here.

 There is always a lot of talk about making for a better quality life here and decreasing problems caused by vehicular transportation.

 The only action taken is to build new roads! A new road for vehicles

- can cost millions of dollars per mile. Paths for pedestrians and cyclists cost in the thousands per mile! Urban flight greatly prohibited non-vehicular methods of transportation. When are we going to find ways to change this? I feel that our vehicular centered society is one major cause of rising cases of diabetes and obesity. Individual medical expenses continue to increase because of poor health from obesity and limited physical activity. Changing Fort Worth and the surrounding areas to a pedestrian friendly environment could help ALL of us in the LONG TERM!
- North Beach St (from N. Tarrant Parkway to Golden Triangle) is badly in need of widening and sidewalks.
- † I think it is unsafe to walk on the sidewalks on Forest Park with so many speeders.
- f Great walking city. Seem to get approached for money at least every other time I go walking. Never aggresively
- I would like to spend more time along trinity trails, but lack of restroom/Portsmouth is limiting. Also scary for women alone. Need more leg friendly walking surfaces. New BRIT has awesome 'eco' walkways more leg friendly. Definitely safety is my biggest concern. Outside if downtown, police presence is scarce. Maybe volunteers in horseback could patrol trinity trails! Hey, it IS Ft Worth!! How awesome would That be?? Lots of out of town folks who visit and stay downtown would probably LOVE an easy way to access trinity trails!
- * Walking paths should be an integral part to any new neighborhood as well as shopping areas.
- † I'm glad we have policemen on horses. They conserve fuel and can quickly go where cars and motor cycles cannot.
- fort worth need light electric train like Portland Oregon. This would be money spend wise not the Rick Perry,s highway."
- † I would just like sidewalks along busy streets.
- * "I would love for Fort Worth to be more pedestrian friendly like so many wonderful European cities are. I walk so much more when overseas than when here. Streets support high speed traffic here with few chances for a walker to cross without running or feeling in danger. Maybe we need some designated crossing areas with islands in the middle of some of these wide streets so walkers can go halfway if not fast enough to cross all the way. Large cosmopolitan cities like London do this and it works. University drive from TCU to the zoo/parks should be designed to encourage

- families to walk to the zoo or park areas and bike trails but now the sidewalk is only on the east side of the street and not wide enough to feel comfortable when walking next to speeding traffic."
- There is no feasible way to walk or bike to any city facilities from my house. There is a planned hike and bike trail planned around Lake Worth which may change that in the future. Bike trails should be planned to go "somewhere" rather than just be a place to ride a bike.
- Fort Worth desperately needs better infrastructure for pedestrians. It has the potential to be a very walkable city, but sidewalks -- when they're there at all -- tend to break off unexpectedly. The most frustrating thing is when you can see your destination, but, because of a highway or railway or whatever, you just can't get there. I very much hope the city will get behind this effort as we have with the Bike Fort Worth project. It's a really quality of life improvement (and property value improvement!) for all of us. Last note: don't forget the trees! Sidewalks are great, but shady sidewalks are even better!
- † "This is an area that we need significant improvement in and the community as a whole is not pedestrian friendly for mobile and mobility restricted pedestrians. In addition, enforcement at crosswalks is a problem and drivers need to be educated about pedestrians."
- † "I primarily walk with a group along trails or in park and enjoy it very much. Some roads, such as University Drive, are difficult to walk along, due to lack of sidewalks and lanes of traffic."
- ★ More bike paths.
- New neighborhoods should be planned with walking destinations in mind. Walking to restaurants, coffee shops, museums, movies, shopping would be highly desirable.
- The three things you need on a walk is some shade, some cool water and after awhile, a clean place to sit.
- ★ Generally poor quality with narrow or no sidewalks along major streets and bridges. Poor pedestrian friendly signalization across major streets (no "count down" signals, etc.)
- Sidewalks, sidewalks, sidewalks. With Fort Worth's growing traffic congestion, pedestrians need safe places to walk. I have walked many places that had curb cuts at intersections but then had no sidewalk to continue on my journey. I would walk more places if I had a safer place to walk. Also consider connected walking paths

- that are not necessarily along side a road like our bike paths. A network of connected pedestrian walk/bike trails that served the entire city would be a big step forward in providing a better quality of life for our city.
- Please install sidewalks along Ten Mile Bridge Road from Boat Club Road to Cromwell Marine Creek Road. This is a busy street and Greenfield Elementary is right on this road. Children often walk home on this road with this busy traffic. It is a wonder, no child has been run over yet. Please look at this issue for the safety of our children attending Greenfield Elementary. Thank you.
- Accessible curbing is spotty in our neighborhood; this is near TCU and impedes some mobility-challenged neighbors/students.
- We live in a beautiful neighborhood (Mistletoe Heights) that has many parks, schools, businesses, and restaurants within walking distance. It is a shame that small sections of missing sidewalks endanger pedestrians and intimidate people from walking more often. The speed and volume of traffic on Forest Park is also a big deterrent for pedestrians. I think a school zone or high activity zone around the intersection of Forest Park and Park Place would not only protect children walking to school, but it would also protect the many joggers, bikers, and pedestrians who cross here during heavy morning traffic.
- † I moved to Fort Worth from out of state. The ability to walk in Fort Worth along roadways, once you get out of downtown, is atrocious.
- † I live in North Tarrant and the biggest issue here is the lack of connectivity and consistancy between good walking / running areas. Also, the primary roads are old and narrow and rough and do not have sidewalks or anything for bikers or pedestrians. A comprehensive map of all trails in Tarrant County would be helpful as well.
- * Need more walk/ running trails to the south side
- We really have great lakes in and around Fort Worth. I would love to see Ft. Worth leading the nation on outdoor recreation. walking trails, hiking trails, biking trails. Make Fort Worth the fittest. In the U.S.
- More functional drinking fountains around running paths on the trinity
- A lot of folks that I talk to are scared of the homeless people walking around the Texas Pacific Lofts area and downtown asking for money or just getting in their face. I was walking on Sunday and had 2 guys

- in their twenties trying to catch me while I was walking along 7th street till I lost them at the Firestone building.
- *More sidewalks in the Meadowbrook area would be nice. Walking can be a challenge when walking. I like this area, but the drivers sometimes can be a bit of a hazard. More patrols for officers would be advisable. We have a lot of children in this neighborhood. I have witnessed many drivers speeding down this thoroughfare. I honestly wouldn't be opposed to having speed bumps down this road."
- ★ Safety is the major concern with walking any distance. Most destinations have areas that are isolated or unsafe.
- I see no need for the extra expense of installing new sidewalks on BOTH sides of the street. Spend that money on opening city pools for the summer!!!
- * "Runners and Walkers use Colonial Pkwy from University Dr going West.. This road is wide enough to have a Bike Lane Stripe painted on it.. Most everyone walking and running uses the North side of this street going and coming.. Automobiles tend to not stay aligned with the center stripe as the go around the curves, they tend to drift from the center line to the curbs and a lot of them overreact and swerve when they see Runners and Walkers as they navigate this road.. I'm surprised that there have not been any Car/Pedestrian accidents on this road.. Bike Lane Stripe would be a quick easy fix.. Thanks.."
- † Though I'm not a resident of the Fairmount neighborhood, i visit there regularly and I am astounded at the horrible condition of the sidewalks on many streets. This is an up and coming neighborhood that is blighted by this condition.
- ★ We need sidewalks!!!!! on all streets, excluding highways
- Pedestrian only areas downtown and in the cultural distract would be nice. Thanks!
- † I run and bike. Really don't walk, unless walking my dog.
- † I'd like to bring my dogs on more walks but need places to tie them up outside of Walgreens and Starbucks!
- I would love more water fountains in the city parks. Specifically Arcadia Park. Gorgeous trails, but no place for water breaks that I have found.
- Would love to walk more if there were more sidewalks and safer roads.
- ★ don't have any thing to say right now

- We live in Berkley, Mistletoe Heights and have 4 kids. They are so limited with riding bikes. We really need the sidewalk from Park Place on Colonial Parkway to be on N/E side so we do not have to cross over. I have a daughter who wants to ride with all of her friends to Paschal but the Forest Park sidewalks are terrible. Number 3 on importance is Forest Park needs to be connected to the trails. Are we going to be able to get to the new Pedestrian bridge? We share these opinions with hundreds of other families. It is a constant battle to discuss with our teenagers which roads they are taking and which ones are the safest- if the sidewalks were repaired this would not be an issue, we do not want them to have to jump into the street so often because the sidewalk switches sides or ends or there is not an entry on a corner(tcu area). Thanks for the survey, so excited!
- † "They are fine. You have ample sidewalks, trails and bike lanes. Intersections are improved and acccessible. Focus on maintenance and repair, and securing funding for such, prior to expansion. Learn the lesson of your failures from the North Fort Worth road/streets expansion, acceptance, and failure debacle."
- ★ WE love Trinity Trails- Probably the best place to walk in FW
- The Baylor Hospital Distric area is becoming a traffic nightmare. The east side of the Mistletoe Heights neighborhood is taking a tremendous hit from speeding motorists up and down our residential streets where children play in the front yards, pets are present, etc. Impatient motorists cut through the neighborhood streets throughout the day, not just early morning or later afternoon. We need more stop signs (especially on Jerome), speed humps on all of the east-west Mistletoe Heights neighborhood streets (on the east side of Forest Park Blvd) and police writing tickets on a daily basis on Forest Park Blvd.
- sidewalks and lights. They need repair/maintenance to keep pedestrians safe.
- "Beginning downtown and in the close-in neighborhoods, Fort Worth needs to survey every street, sidewalk, and intersection to make them continuous, smooth and safe for walkers and people on bikes and in wheelchairs. This should be the first priority of the city in doing all transportation infrastructure planning and financing. Traffic needs to be slowed by real speed bumps and raised crosswalks in residential neighborhoods to insure a maximum speed of 20-30 mph. This is especially true of Forest Park Blvd. through

- Berkley Place, Mistletoe Heights, and Frisco Heights. Raised crosswalks and good pedestrian signals are needed at Park Place and Forest Park and at Mistletoe Blvd. and Forest Park, and raised crosswalks and speed bumps need to be placed on Jerome to slow traffic to 20-25mph to make a safe passage for children to Lily B. Clayton. And again, the sidewalks curbs in Mistletoe Heights need repaired and need to be made continuous."
- "Runners prefer asphalt over concrete for walking path construction. Would love to see Westcreek connect to the Trinity Trails. The Trinity trails is a wonderful asset to Fort Worth. However it needs more water fountains, public restrooms (or port o potties) and shade. Being out on the Trinity can be brutal in the summer. The Foster-Hartwood-Overton park paths is one of the best walking/running places in South/central Fort Worth for it's shade and asphalt, but it can be a bit congested with bikers and walkers and runners and dogs all sharing the same trail. I would love to see more crushed caliche paths alongside asphalt paths in our parks (like on the Trinity river). Please don't use concrete in the construction of park paths! Oakmont Park is a good example of a well built park with water, restrooms and shade except for it's concrete paths! As a runner I avoid this park because concrete is hard on the knees. I also avoid Candleridge and Kellis parks for this same reason."
- One of the best things about downtown Fort Worth is that you can walk around! I love going downtown to socialize and to walk. But I can't walk in my own neighborhood! The sidewalks are dangerous or absent. Small children can't safely ride their bikes or skate on the sidewalks because they are so bad or not there. The grade school children can't even walk to school because there is not adequate safe sidewalks or crossings for them in a NEIGHBORHOOD. We as home owners take great pride in where we live, we keep our homes nice, we keep our yards nice and yet our sidewalks are horrible. Many of us are also very green, and would walk if it was safe to do so. I have runners and walkers choosing the street over the sidewalks to prevent injury, and that is not a safe thought either with the cars speeding down the streets! And I would gladly walk to University Place or up Forest Park to the shops up there, but it isn't safe. I have fallen once and really hurt myself, because of the sidewalks.

- Due to the lack of adequate public transportatin in Fort Worth it is important that the people have sidewalks that can safely transport them form one area to another. Children need to be able to safely walk to school and without a sidewalk this is not always possible.
- * "It's too bad there isn't a convenient bus route for us to get downtown or to West 7th. We were trying to get from Forest Park and Mistletoe to the West 7th development and we had to drive. We would have been happy to use public transportation, but getting to any bus stop would have required almost a mile walk. Additionally, getting to West 7th would have required at least 2 transfers. Totally inconvenient."
- * "Any place where large numbers of people congregate is where you need safety. Schools, malls, retail, museums. someone needs to get out to my house and take a look at the sidewalk in the front. There is going to be a lawsuit when an elderly person falls because the concrete is now missing. I've been asking for 16 years."
- My main concern within my neighborhood is the speed of the cars. I feel that in residental neighborhoods cars travel too fast. There are adults and small children walking, and kids sometimes fall off the sides of sidewalks. If the traffic is traveling too fast they are at risk of being hit. There are speed bumbs on my road but I find they have minimal impact on the speed of cars.
- † I've only live here 20 years and have never seen speed enforcement on Forest Park.
- t's hard to feel safe walking or biking in Fort Worth because drivers don't seem to recognize the right of anyone not driving a car to use roads or highways. I don't trust a driver to stop when I am in an intersection. I used to drive my children across Forest Park Blvd. because I was afraid they would be run down crossing an intersection. I see pedestrians now run to cross Forest Park even at the light on Mistletoe Blvd. Crossing at other streets means taking your life in your hands. Drivers need to be educated about pedestrian rights and then should be ticketed for failing to yield. I suggest a campaign to make Fort Worth the best walking city in the country would spark some local pride. I have just returned from New York and Boston. Many people walk and bike everywhere; it's simply understood that they have the right-of-way.
- Sidewalks and curbss in Mistletoe Hts have been in need of repair for a long time. At times there is so much traffic on my street it make it difficult to allow my children to go outside and play. Esp in

- the PM when hospital personel are using our streets as a shortcut to Forest Park Blvd. There again traffice speed is excessive and causes a saftey issue.
- Control the speed of drivers on Forest Park Blvd!! It is getting dangerous. I can barely make a left off my street anymore! I cant walk my kids to Tillery Park b/c I am terrified that we will be hit! I have often thought Forest Park should be brought back to a true boulevard with a strip down the center with trees and only one lane in each direction. This would certainly make the neighborhood beautiful and deter people from using Forest Park as a cut through to South Fort Worth. If this is not possible, how about traffic lights that turn red if you go over the posted speed limit? We had these in Virginia and they work! There were signs warning drivers, "Obey Speed Limit or Traffic Lights will Change." And they did! If this is not possible, how about one of those signs that shows how fast you are going? Or even speed bumps? Now, with this horrible hotel going in at the corner of Rosedale/Forest Park...I can only imagine how much traffic my historic neighborhood will get.
- "Our neighborhood is growing and we need to have safe streets for pedestrians and bikers. No safe passage from Lily B Clayton and Newby Park."
- * "sidewalks in our neighborhood have been destroyed in some cases by tree roots and this needs to be addressed so people of all ages and abilities can safely walk or push a wheelchair, ride a bike, ETC. Children needing or wanting to walk to Lily b. risk their lives due to speeding motorists. Would be nice to have elevated walkways."
- If you do put in more sidewalks, please go around the existing trees like other forward thinking cities. There are no sidewalks in my neighborhood.
- My neighborhood of Mistletoe Heights is full of cracked, broken and dangerously uneven sidewalks throughout. Most people have taken to walking in the middle of the street (also dangerous) to avoid the dilapidated sidewalks! Street curbs are also crumbling or nonexistent everywhere in the neighborhood."
- Fort Worth is one of the least friendly cities for walkers I've seen.
- "I love to walk and it is sad that due to the lack of pedestrian friendly areas people have to use a car to go to the store or to the park. If we build safer pedestrian area more people will go from home to the parks and shops to do Exercise, enjoy the walk with friends and family. I work downtown and enjoy walking in a safe,

- clean environment. Would like to see 8th ave./Forest Park/Park hill Jerome st and 7th st become more pedestrian friendly. Even from Downtown to the Stockyards."
- ★ Let's make it happen
- * "We need sidewalks for children, for theirs and our safety. 2300 Block of Mistletoe Drive Sidewalks start on the other side of Mistletoe drive but to not continue thru???"
- † Please, please use some of the city's money to improve our sidewalks in Mistletoe Heights and build sidewalks to Lily B. Clayton. One day a very critical accident will occur -- we don't want the city to wait to do something until something tragic occurs. We need your help. Thank you!
- * "Greater security on Trinity Trail please! Also need new sidewalks and curbs on 2300 block of Irwin in Mistletoe Heights."
- * "It would have been nice to have access to a streetcar system which would have circulated downtown. It's nice to take a predictable public transport system to another area of town and then walk from there. Slowing traffic through the downtown area would significantly affect my sense of well-being while walking downtown. It seems as if many drivers don't understand that traffic downtown is meant to move slower than major arteries in the suburbs. Planting trees along sidewalks also makes walking in warmer weather more bearable."
- too many speeders on Forest Park
- * "We'd like sidewalks on our street, Wooten Dr., from Trail Lake to Westcreek. (At least on one side). We'd also like bus service close by. If it were safer I'd be happy to walk more. We also need a grocery store within walking distance."
- † "The sidewalks in Mistletoe Heights need a lot of repairs. On a positive note, the city has done a lot in recent years to improve the walkability of Magnolia East of 8th Ave."
 - * "WHAT ARE THE MOST DANGEROUS WALKING AREAS IN FORT WORTH???" The Bike Trails """" We loved to the walk the 'bike' trails. But No More! The bikers travel VERY FAST.
- They come up behind you and yell ""Passing on the left"" and before you can take four steps to the edge they zoom by. A collision is an accident waiting to happen. When the money comes available it would be great to have parallel walking and biking lanes."
- Building a bridge over the creek from park to school will help greatly making walking safe for these kids and shorting the walk will ease

- the minds of most parents. Maybe puting sidewalk form the field from bridge to school would be nice for those wet days. Thank you
- Raised Crosswalk at Rosedale would be good when midtown development is completed
- "Schools, libraries and parks need to be considered and important part of the overall sidewalk improvement projects. These are places where MANY people walk daily, and we need to encourage physical and mental activity. If the city services (parks and libraries) can be more safely accessed on foot, perhaps even more people will get out of their vehicles and walk. Thanks for doing this survey and for working to improve safe pedestrian traffic in FW. I love our city!"
- † People will do more walking if it was safe, if the area where they like to walk is clean, has lights when the sun goes down, and not surranded with tall grass.
- We have some sidewalks in the Mistletoe and Berkeley neighborhoods, however many of those are in bad shape. Forest Park is hazardous at most times of the day due to speeding traffic. There are no raised crossing areas except in front of Paschal. There should be raised crosswalks at Park Place and at Mistletoe Blvd. and lower speeds throughout. Bicycle lanes would be a big help too. There are many bike paths in the area, but they are very difficult to reach without traversing Forest Park. The problems have gotten worse with the road construction closing the Rosedale to I-30 ramp. It was not a good situation before and is worse now.
- * "We love the Trinity trail along the river through Trinity Park. The water fountain is great. We are happy to have sidewalks in most of Mistletoe Heights, and would like to fill in the missing blocks."
- * We walk on a regular basis, but would do more if our sidewalks were better, more connected. Many area have none which is esp a problem on busy streets ie riverside/basswood.
- * broken irregular sidewalks need upgrading
- * "Enforce or expand animal control. Trinity Trails is 2 blocks from my home but I had to buy a treadmill instead. I can no longer use the trails due to people letting their animals roam free. One large dog jumped me, knocked me down and broke my ankle. The owner just ran on by. The trails have a leash law but it's not enforced. The owners get around the law by having a leash on the dogs but the leash is dragging on the ground behind the dog while the dog is roaming free. I have witnessed too many dog fights on the trails as well because the owners don't have leash control of the dog. MUCH

- heavier fines are needed for breaking the school zone and overall speed limit laws. Speed bumps don't work. I personally think cameras are needed EVERYWHERE. The only deterent is to hit peple in the wallet and hit them hard."
- † I'm from Europe and it is of my opinion that you could enhance walking facilities and pedestrian rights of way extensively, but without a public transportation system to back it up the positive impact would be limited.
- * Police and/or code enforcement must start aggressively ticketing residents who park their vehicles across the sidewalk--an issue that can make neighborhood streets virtually unwalkable, but one that's routinely ignored unless specific complaints are made. The money generated by these citations would also provide a small revenue boost for the city.
- The older neighborhoods, where a lot of lower- to middle-income families live, need to have sidewalks. Texas is the only place I've ever lived where sidewalks were not installed in neighborhoods built in the 40s and 50s.
- * "Our city was built for vehicles only. Knowing and understanding economy low. It would be fine to have a least a block all way around with sidewalks on every neighborhood for exercise purposes and long sidewalks to main avenues to get to bus stops, to use mass transportation. Also bicycles paths, away from vehicular traffic, would it be fine."
- * sidewalks are definitely needed if schools cut bus services.
- Pedestrian walks needed especially on bridges (ie Hulen over the RR tracks).
- † Let's educate the kids, not restrict traffic flow.
- † I have three small children and my youngest happens to be disabled, due to how bad traffic is in our block of 2700 McKinley Avenue. I limit them to their outside activities.
- My family is very active, and we love to walk. It seams that connecting our community with additional sidewalks to other communities and the adjacent shopping centers would immensely improve the quality of life of my family, and those in my community that enjoy walking also.
- It is not very consistent traveling on foot/ bike in Fort Worth. I do not drive, so I walk/ bus/ train everyday. If I did not live Downtown& have my office in the Cultural District, I would have a difficult time getting back& forth on foot.

- † I live, school, and shop in a relatively nice area so I can only imagine the poorer neighborhoods are that much worse!
- Since the realignment of 9th, it is sometimes difficult to cross Throckmorton going east towards the ATT building because there is now no light there.
- * "Update T maps to show walking distance from stop to walkable destination. Create Pedestrian Zones that emphasise foot traffic over vehicles and slow vehicles down through the zones. Create pedestrian link to Phyllis Tilley bridge with the east side of Forest Park Blvd, not just the existing bike/hike trail."
- † I am a teacher. The school where I teach did a walking school bus project this semester. It was almost impossible to find a reasonable route from some residences because of the lack of sidewallks. We all know that Fort Worth has a clean air problem, and the nation has an obesity problem. I think Fort Worth would be a much healthier place to live with better sidewalk coverage. THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR TAKING UP THIS TASK.:)
- The sidewalks need improvement for the Mistletoe Heights
 Neighborhood as it's a very active walking community of adults and
 children. The walking is reduced to being on the streets where many
 drivers are careless and don't yield the street warnings and signs
 and sometimes ignore pedestrians.
- With the cities budget being what it is, spending money on elective expenditures such sidewalks etc. is not sustainable. The cities number 1 job should be cutting costs not adding additional hardscape to an already overly paved landscape. I grew up here in FW and walked to and from school with my sister and friends from grades K-12. The area were I walked was in the Wedgwood neighborhood we walked on the grass not the street. There were not any sidewalks then and there are not now. I currently live in Mistletoe Heights, the city has not maintained the sidewaks in this area why would we want to add more that the city will not maintain. Leave my lawn alone, the grass will help the city more than another strip of pavement.
- Mistletoe Heights would appreciate attention to sidewalks and joining of drive ways to be fixed. Many are broken and in disrepair. Several areas could use joining.
- Please more sidewalks leading from Old Denton to Heritage Trace Pkwy. Fort Worth has done a great job with the traffic lights, now

- our families would love to enjoy the area that is growing SO fast. Bike and Sidewalks......
- Forest Park blvd between W. Roesdale and W. Berry has become a racetrack. Driver speed is a problem. Certain times of the day are noteworthy. 1. Safety is a problem when Paschal High is dismissed; teenagers on cell phones behind the wheel fly out of the parking lots. 2. Construction on I-30/Southwest Parkway is causing increased congestion and speed as drivers to and from work use it as a "cut-through" route.
- * "Improvements should be made to connect neighborhoods to schools and shopping, you should not have to walk in the street with your children. Improvement is necessary to close in areas such as the Near Southside/Hospital district so that they can better access downtown. bike lanes and sidewalks to major attractions such as botanical gardens and zoo."
- Running trails! It would be fun to have the sidewalks/streets marked for running by distance and maybe even adding in local sites of interest for tourists (and those of us new to town!).
- We are WILLING AND READY to walk/bike more in Mistletoe Heights, although when walking down Jerome or Mistletoe Blvd, it looks as if our car has broken down! We need sidewalks on Jerome from Park Place to Rosedale. We need sidewalks on Mistletoe Blvd and Rosedale from Forest Park to 8th ave! We have got to get drivers to slow way down on Forest Park! We need to increase ticketing, speed bumps, traffic lights and alternate routes. I now many neighbors (many children) who have almost gotten run over when using the sidewalks on Forest Park! As a resident of Mistletoe Heights, we also need a way to walk or bike across the Trinity River without having to walk or bike across the Forest Park Miniature Train bridge! The Mistletoe Heights residents have a willingness, and the resources to support all of these wonderful surrounding business without having to start up our cars! We also want to be able to safely walk/bike to school or doctors appointments!"
- We walk a lot from Carrol to downtown, and Carrol to University. The sidewalks are narrow and uneven. I appreciate you looking into improvements. Just one of the many reasons Fort Worth is a great place to live. Thanks!
- † I think that an information pamphlet should be mailed out regarding the laws of pedestrians, bicyclists, and drivers in regards to the right away of each other & the tickets/violations you can get if you don't

- follow these laws. I think alot of adults either don't remember these or chose not to remember these.
- † improve them--it will make our city better
- There are areas where the sidewalk is great and then it just ends. It would be great to see sidewalk corridors connected. Also, along University Drive, where the railroad tracks cross over near Vickery, there is hardly any room for someone to walk along there. This is an area that could be so pedestrian friendly too.
- * some sidewalks in the Mistletoe Heights area need repair.
- * roads leading to parks and popular "hot spots" in Fort Worth should have sidewalks that ease a parking problem by allowing pedestrians to walk to their destination.
- * "Older neighborhoods need sidewalks, too-- especially on streets that are often used as cut-through routes by people living outside the neighborhood. Speed humps help A LOT, but it's still too dangerous on some streets to ride a bike or walk to school."
- † Hope to see improvements. We all need to walk more.
- † If there were sidewalks in my neighborhood, the children could ride bikes or walk to their friends' houses more safely. As it is, they are in the road to play and ride and too many cars parked on the road makes it dangerous for children.
- † "I have visited many places and Fort Worth is about the worst pedestrian friendly place I have every visited. We lived in Alaska for more than 10 years and they have a better pedestrian system than Fort Worth!"
- Feven where there are sidewalks and crosswalks many of our roadways are wide and don't provide enough time to cross. In addition drivers tend to pull into the crosswalk before they stop even when not making a right on red. This makes things very unsafe for pedestrians. The type of development that has been done in the 7th Street area has been great but with drivers who still feel they don't have to stop before the crosswalk and who speed though we will never have a completely pedestrian friendly town. Please continue to use traffic calming devices (NOT SPEED BUMPS!)

 Narrowing of traffic lanes, bulb outs, on street parking, landscaping, etc. what has been done along Berry Street in the TCU Pascal High school area is a good example but we still have issues with uneducated drivers. We look forward to those improvements being continued all the way to University. Education, Education, Education! Drivers need to learn that they don't own the road!

- It will be important to coordinate walking improvements with an updating of building and zoning codes so that developers will be encouraged to build places that are worth walking to.
- I am very excited to see improvements to Fort Worth as a pedestrian city.
- All new building must provide sidewalks for area (homes, apartment and business).
- † I think Fort worth is on the right track with questionnaire.
- Thank you for your time and efforts in just asking these questions. It does raise consciousness, and hopefully more than that. I have seen gradual improvements in Fort Worth's willingness to develop greener pathways.
- * "New development is obviously much better particularly on Rosedale. Many of the sidewalks that are currently in place along major streets are too narrow for more than 1 or 2 people to walk safely ex Forest Park, 8th Ave. We need our urban streets to mirror what's been done with Magnolia for pedestrian and bicycle traffic."
- Some improvements in areas I mentioned already underway, but need to cover complete path between all locations I mentioned. Breaks in sidewalks where land undeveloped not acceptable and not safe. Must cross in middle of street to get to another sidewalk or walk in high grass at times. Love my Wedgwood Library! Vega too curvy to allow cars to park on it, real dangerous for walkers. Vega alternative to busy Woodway (even with sidewalks)
- Fix the broken sidewalks along Forest Park Blvd.
- the main reason I don't even walk around my neighborhood for exercise is lack of sidewalks. Cars go way too fast on my street (Blossom Drive) and through my neighborhood and due to lack of sidewalks I just don't feel safe.
- † There are no sidewalks in our neighborhood. Walking in the street is UNSAFE because of the speed of automobile traffic.
- † Drivers who text/phone while driving are a constant threat to both pedestrians and other drivers. The city police seems to take little interest in regulating this practice, especially in school zones.
- Sidewalks should be a priority to a nation interested in conserving fossil fuels and ending obesity. Fort Worth has many nice sidewalks in my area but we could use more.
- † I would love to walk more, but destinations aren't close enough to walk and I often don't feel safe to walk in my neighborhood.

 Improve safety first and I'll start walking more.

- † This area near Alliance mall is growing much faster than the surrounding roads or sidewalks can keep up.
- none of the choices was walking corridors or something, that sounds terrible because somebody could hang out in there
- * Community education on pedestrian rights of way and education on proper crosswalk use would be beneficial.
- More intersections need to have ramps so that wheelchair users do not have to risk tipping over trying to cross a street.
- Right on red and pedestrian walk at signals are difficult when traffic does not yeild to pedestrians. No right on red where pedestrian traffic is high.
- I was almost denied homeowner's insurance on my house in the 2300 block on Irwin Street in Mistletoe Heights because of the disrepair of the sidewalks. In walking in the neighborhood there are several times when we must walk in the street as opposed to the sidewalks. Mistletoe Heights is a historic neighborhood and many people walk our streets. Frankly, it is a disgrace that so many of the sidewalks are unsafe.
- We are entering an age of conservation wherein walking and bicycling will become increasingly relevant. Fort Worth should embrace this transition to improve residents' quality of life. The fringe benefit for the city will be positive publicity about Fort Worth's livability. A first step would be to make neighborhoods and public areas pedestrian- and bike-friendly.
- † I don't think I would ever ride a bicycle in this City, it is far too dangerous.
- The T does not service Meadowbrook. The drivers are rude, they lie and the reps at the call center don 't know how to read a schedule. How many times have I missed a bus relying on their information? MITS leaves people stranded. When I or someone in my family complains, we barley get a response. They certainly do not compensate us for our difficulties. The T needs to shape up or fold! I walk too great of a distance to ride with them for them to behave this way toward me! They should be helpful and courteous to every rider! Your fares increase but your customer service just keeps getting worse and worse. I don't know if my complaint is appropriate for this field. If not, please forward to the right office.
- Please make this a priority. We need more folks and children active and this will go a long way to meet this goal plus reduce pollution and save people money!

- We moved from Chicago where walking was our main form of transportation. We only looked for homes in The mistletoe and berkley neighborhoods because of the abilities to walk and because of the proximity to parks, shops/pedestrian friendly areas and schools. However we have been disappointed in the quality of the sidewalks throughout our neighborhood and the lack of safe pedestrian crossings at intersections. It is a shame because there aren't that many fort worth neighborhoods with sidewalks so at least those who have them should have safe ones!!
- In general, adding throughout the entire city more sidewalks, clearly marked crosswalks, and bike lanes such as those recently added around the shopping areas near the Cultural District would greatly improve walking conditions for pedestrians.
- Most sidewalks are in bad shape, sidewalks are needed badly in many area of my neighborhood alone. There are no sidewalks along Jerome for example and that is the major thoroughfare to Lily B. Clayton. There is NO safe way for students to get from the west side of Forest Park Blvd to Lily B. Clayton. Drivers are inattentive, there are only 2 crosswalks, the speeds are horrendous I have personally witnessed several vehicles flipped upside down due to unreasonable speed and carelessness on Forest Park Blvd. I expect it to only grow worse with the advent of the SW Parkway.
- We are fortunate to live within a mile for both our elementary (Bette Perot) and middle school (Timberview) however due to traffic concerns we drive far more than walk or bike. 30 mph in residential is far too fast (the fastest in all the 8 states I've resided in. Additionally enforcement of speed offenders during non school zone hours is very limited. Even if we provide adequate walking and biking spaces it is so scary to send our children out there with the high speeds people drive. Walking isn't an option as long as we fear for our lives with the drivers racing by.
- * Sidewalks, bike lanes on major intersections.
- The intersection at Arbor and Sycamore School Road All traffic coming out of the neighborhood at Arbor should have a right turn only sign and all traffic coming out of the Taco Bell Parking Lot should have a right turn only sign."
- Fort Worth must have good safe sidewalks in every neighborhood. They are very more important.
- * "Myself and my family have just moved from Norway (Europe) where walking ANYWHERE is possible and natural. One of the

biggest factors I have noticed which makes me scared to walk places here is that the sidewalks are too close to the intersections. In Norway, the sidewalks are some feet away from the road, so that if a car where to turn from a main street to smaller one, they would actually have the chance to see you. Also the speed limit is too high (40mph!) in general which definitely discourages pedestrians. Speed bumps, roundabouts, and flashing lights at major pedestrian crossings were some of the tactics used in Norway. Also at Every intersection, no matter how small, there were crosswalks and if a pedestrian approached, cars stopped immediately. This is possible only if the speed limit is lower and there is a major campaign to educate drivers. Also there was a major campaign to distribute 'slap bracelet' personal reflectors and childrens outwear had always reflector."

- Cars should always yield to pedestrians at an intersection, as in Portland.
- People that ride bikes on 7th street use the sidewalks and not the newly created bike lane, which is unsafe, especially on the 7th Street bridge. 99% of the time bike riders use the sidewalk because it's safer because the city removed a lane of traffic in an area that an expansion of traffic lanes was more necessary than creating a bike lane that no one uses.
- ★ School zone signs should be added to the approaching side roads.
- May consider an sidewalk adoption program similar to the Trinity Trails in which cleanup and beautification projects are maintained by adopting organizations. I ride my bike on a few sidewalks and have noticed that some are poorly maintained and covered with litter including broken glass which can be a walking hazard.
- The city obviously is lacking in this area. Anyone can drive around the city and be made aware of much-needed improvements.
- ★ none
- I greatly enjoy walking in Fort Worth, and rarely consider it a dangerous activity- only when the sidewalks end, or are in disrepair, which is common. I cannot say I commonly walk to run errands even though I would like to. I cannot say with certainty that my path will ever contain safe sidewalks or crossings, so I rarely choose walking as my primary transportation when I am outside the downtown area.
- * "more linear park sidewalking sidewalks in older post WWII neighborhoods (eg Westcliff and South Hills and Wedgwood"

- Encourage development of urban-type areas (as in 7th Street) and a public transportation system that does not force people to rely on a schedule. Fewer bus lines running more frequently will encourage people to use them. And PLEASE develop a street car system between key locations (downtown to museums to TCU, Stockyards to downtown to hospitals).
- † I have to cross Woodmont Park after dark and there is not enough lighting, as well as gang and vandalism activity there
- † I enjoy using the walking paths along the river. However, I do have arthritis in my hips and knees and need to take frequest rest breaks. There are not enough benches along the paths for me to take those breaks so I don't walk as often as I would like.
- the city of fort worth should make builders put in sidewalks in neighborhoods; make more time to be able to walk thru a crosswalk especially when it is six lanes; when sidewalks are built (especially by businesses), ensure they are not overgrown with weeds and grass; this also includes those sidewalks that are along a busy street beside fields---keep them trimmed. The sidewalks on Sycamore School Rd after the railroad tracks and before the light at Crowley road seem to be getting smaller due to the grass growing over them. Also ensure homeowners (whether they own or rent) to keep the sidewalks trimmed. I know it may seem like a lost cause, but starting having a bunch of commercials about looking out for pedestrians!!!!!
- * Build sidewalks and shoulders when you build a road.
- Having moved to Texas from the Portland, Oregon I was very discouraged at the lack of sidewalks in many Fort Worth neighborhoods. It makes it difficult to take a walk (especially pushing a stroller and with a dog)! I have to be VERY alert walking in my neighborhood.
- * Bridge at low water crossing.
- I walk everywhere and now that i have a toddler I notice how unsafe it is to walk across the street to go to the market. Driving laws need to be enforced. Drivers get away with way too much and its sad that crossing the street can become a life threatening situation because the car or truck driver wants to be in a rush to get somewhere or is talking on the phone and is distracted. I hate walking sometimes for this reason, and also there are no sidewalks in certain areas and too much construction that is causing problems with walking as well. the workers do not know how to control traffic and me and my

- daughter have to walk in the street because of the blockage from the construction.
- Please help give our children a safe passage to school. The only path for walkers, bike riders is a narrow sidewalk along a bridge that is a main busy entrance/exit for the neighborhood. There are no guard rails or anything to keep children from losing balance or being knocked into traffic. There is a park that the community was told a bridge would be built to give children direct access to thier elementary school. 2011/2012 school year these kids no longer have bus transportation available to them. More students will walk or bike. This means more chance for accidents and more children attempting to cross the creek at the park and then walk through and overgrown field. This area floods when we have a lot of rain. These students are being placed in harms way without being given adequate means to get to the school safely.
- In the area of Heritage Trace Parkway off of I-35W, there are currently no walking paths on the west side of the interstate. I know that this housing area is a more recent housing development, but with the quick population growth, and also the proximity to the new stores at Alliance Town Center, it would be a great idea to provide walking paths to the families that live down there to walk and ride bikes. This would not only include a path that is self contained in this general area, but also sidewalks and crosswalks that would allow residents to walk to the stores at Alliance Town Center.
- "Jerome St. doesn't have sidewalks down the complete street. Secondly there is only one stop sign on this very straight street, so cars are able to gather a lot of speed. Cars from the hospital district speed down this street to avoid the intersection of Forest Park and Rosedale. The speeding on Forest Park Blvd. makes this road dangerous to cross as a pedestrian. Lots of people cross this street to exercise, visit neighbors, and walk their children to Lily B. Clayton. The speed limit needs to be lowered to 25-30 mph, and strictly enforced, through the Berkley & Mistletoe Heights neighborhoods. Multiple accidents have occurred at the curve right before Harrison Ave if you are traveling towards downtown. Cars have left the road and slid down the sidewalk. The last accident I witnessed required that the driver be cut out of the car and the fire hydrant flew 1/2 block down the sidewalk due to the impact. This is ridiculous on a residential street with a 35 mph speed limit."

- I appreciate all Fort worth is doing to improve and adding more sidewalks. Its needed. Especially neighborhoods and trinity trails. No improvement needed for downtown or shopping areas they never looked better. Safety is the reason I don't walk in my neighborhood. There are too many loose dogs that bit. they are both street dogs and have masters that lets them run loose. I'm not even worried about gang activity just viscous dogs. So I drive to trinity park or other safer areas. the best walking city would be a city that provided walking trail for every neighborhood rich or poor. And addition having a serious rounding up of loose dogs. If there's no safety added people are not going to walk with or without new sidewalks. Thanks for the suvey
- The city should automatically include sidewalks for street /curb rebuilds under capital improvement projects if they are not there in all neighborhoods, not just certain low income areas. At least survey the property owners to see if they want the sidewalks, so as not to descriminate one neighborhood over another, as it seems now.
- I used to live in Fort Worth and I still visit friends there very often. I used to walk around some parts of Fort Worth quite frequently despite the cruddy conditions. Crime has never been an issue for me because I'm a very intimidating figure but I do recognize that other people will refrain from walking around at night because the lack of simple street lights makes them an easy target for the less virtuous citizens. This fall after the heat fades I would like to get back into hiking but I am concerned that I won't find any good locations outside of the wealthier parts of Tarrant County. And I don't exactly want to take to strolling in those parts of town because the wealthy folks enjoy keeping their well-maintained neighborhoods to themselves. Athletic people like me have to buy treadmills because walking in the city is not very attractive an idea.
- Due to extreme hot weather it would be good to have some resting areas, benches and water stations, available to cool off. Sprayers or cool mist areas? even better. This could be a live saver for people as well as our beloved pets!
- We must get APS for blind people at all major intersections and located around every school and college (e.g. FWISD, TCU, SWBTS, etc).
- * More trees to protect from Sun needed!
- Many roads don't have sidewalks and this is a danger to drivers and pedestrians.

- When developers start communities they should be required to put in sidewalks, even on the empty lots. Also, owners of undeveloped property should be required to put in sidewalks if the property is in a neighborhood that has them.
- We moved to the area for walkability, and were saddened to see the limitations thereof. Thank you for publishing this survey; I look forward to seeing the response & improvements.
- How about bike routes to ease traffic and reduce smog?
- Police enforcement of parking ordiances and bicycles on sidewalks in downtown
- * "It would be wonderful if mass public transportation could return to a trolley/subway system to help elevate limitations for pedestrians making long distance commutes. This system would have to be reliable and faster than that of the current system of bus transportation for many to use on a regular basis. I would suggest a dedicated lane for Running/Walking individuals and additional lane dedicated for bikers. At times Trinity can be very crowded with bikers and runners that accidents almost occur. We have had to teach our children to be on constant vigilance while on the paved trail so that they are not mowed over by bikers or runners. These possible accidents would eliminate if the paved lane was doubled or an additional lane was created to accommodate the users."
- † Things are too spread out in Fort Worth for walking or biking. More attention should be paid to increasing traffic throughput for automotive traffic instead of spending money on sidewalks or bike lanes that will go unused.
- * "Please consider the encouragement of sensible action before you just throw money at some project or study. My family is increasingly concerned at the number of walkers, runners and bicyclist that do not practice personal safety. Every day I see pedestrians that are walking WITH the traffic instead of against it. Bike riders with no helmet, or they ride on sidewalks instead of the street, as well as disregard stop signs and traffic around them. It is also surprising how many people, particularly STUDENTS at TCU and high school areas, cross streets and are texting or talking on their phone paying no attention to their surroundings. Encouraging SAFE behavior works and should be considered and practiced. There are already numerous sidewalks and pedestrian friendly aspects in our city, now is the time to tell the community ""GET SAFE, BE SAFE, SAFETY IS YOUR JOB""!

- At the very least, I would support MINIMAL money going toward billboards that encourage this."
- † I've been walking to lose weight, and this neighborhood has almost no sidewalks. Kids who walk to school are almost hit on a daily basis due to the faulty drivers. The drivers text so much, that they swerve to miss people and things. East Fort Worth needs help. It seems like access to Atwood McDonald school needs a lot of help so as to children and people like me will not get hit.
- * We need more sidewalks.
- † Having sidewalks in each neighborhood will help keep our children safer when they are playing with their riding toys, such as, trikes, bikes, skateboards, etc.
- * Any improvements would be greatl appreciated.
- † It's dangerous to walk in my neighbor. Crime, vandals, graffiti, etc is bad enough. It's too scary to walk at night, esp since there's not many street lights.
- Fort Worth needs to encourage more walking and neighborhoods with services to walk to. The less driving we do, the better our air quality and health. It would be great to have neighborhoods with more home businesses that people could walk to within their neighborhoods.
- "In situations where residential backyard fences face avenues and boulevards, there is a serious lack of maintenance of the grass between the sidewalk and the street, and between the sidewalk and the fence. This seriously affects walking down the sidewalk. Although there is a requirement that grass and weeds be kept under 1 foot high, there is absolutely no city code that requires the trimming of grass and weeds that grow horizontally and cover the sidewalk pavement, or grow horizontally over the curb and into the street. A 3 foot wide concrete sidewalk is frequently reduced to 1 foot of clear pavement because dallisgrass, bermudagrass, and other horizontally growing weeds encroach on the pavement and never get trimmed. About 10 years ago, the Code Compliance home page had a message in LARGE LETTERS that said basically: ""CODE COMPLIANCE DOES NOT ENFORCE HORIZONTAL GRASS"". We need an ordinance requiring that grass and weeds be trimmed when they cover sidewalks or grow over curbs."

- † I'm glad to be apart of a city who is looking for ways to take care of our safety, health and our earth. We need walking and pedestrian facilities in the City of Fort Worth.
- * Fort worth is EXTREMELY limited in its pedestrian facilities except for one or two spots . QUITE bizarre to see no sidewalks in residential areas especially around schools and parks.
- * We need more police forces out here... and i was wanted SPEED BUMPS here in the Edney area we have alot of childrens and we have alot of crazy drunk drivers in our area and its very dangous and scarey.
- Sidewalks along major streets, like Beach, Basswood, Western Center, etc, need to be widened to allow for passing pedestrian traffic and bicycle traffic.
- We have many people in motorized wheelchairs in are area who are forced to use the side of the road to "drive on". It isn't safe. A sidewalk wide enough for them is a NECESSITY is this area. Often they have no other means of transport or a way to simply get out of the house. This is neccesssary for their physical and mental well being. Please give them sidewalks. Specifically along busy and hilly roads.
- † I am stunned that a city as spread out as Fort Worth, that does not have "neighborhood" conveniences (such neighborhood retail that would encourage walking, and even a decent mass transit system that would promote more walking (waiting 30 mins for a bus or talking a mile to the nearest bus stop doesn't work) would even think about promoting pedestrian travel. There are too many other serious issues in this city that need attention.
- The North Fort Worth Area around Alliance Town Center has lots of new communities, shops and businesses & it would be great to walk or bike to work but some streets don't have sidewalks. I work in the community and have to drive just a few minutes to shop and work when I could walk or ride my bike. Thanks for your help.
- I guess the crime keeps me from walking a lot of times, too.
 Everyone in my neighborhood walks around with sticks or golf clubs.
 While I don't feel unsafe at my house or anything, people feeling like they need to carry sticks and stuff around makes me feel like I should be more worried than I am. One woman I asked about it said that there are a lot of thefts and also a lot of loose dogs so that was why she thought people were always carrying sticks. I'm not sure what to think about all that.

- † "I do not understand why sidewalks are not considered when new residential and commercial building is taking place. Where I grew up it was the norm. It encourages walking!"
- There are multiple shopping opportunities/quick trips around where I live, and I would love to be able to walk to them if it were safe to do so. As it stands, traffic along South Dr. and Granbury Rd. prohibits that. I don't feel safe cross either road with my baby in tow. If I ever want to go on a walk with my family, we have to drive to a park. We don't even live very far away from Foster Park, but can't walk there because of the traffic and lack of sidewalks. I think even adding sidewalks to our area would be a huge improvement.
- † I think all roads that have more than 2 lanes in any direction should have sidewalks. I lived on South Dr for 3 years and could not walk my dogs (or myself) in fear of being run over b/c there are no sidewalks on that road. Houses have worn spots on their grass adjacent to the roadway from foot traffic.
- * "Visibility, safe hardscapes, away from environmental dangers, buffered from street traffic, good lighting, if you really want to encourage walking, need periodic call boxes for assistance.

 Recognize that the HEAT will discourage long walking distances and if there is no destinations nearby or you must carry items to and from less shopping will occur as well."
- the neww additions. We have lived on our street for 30 years. We do not have a sidewalk on one side of our street. There is not a safe route for our children to walk to the local community center. Furthermore, there are no bike or walking trails that our children can access. It is alot more dangerous for them to ride in the streets. Especially since Francis St. is a curve with no signs. There have been numerous accidents with vehicles wrecking on our lawns and fences.
- It would be really great if I could snag a streetcar on my way to work!
- * trail crossings need more visability
- * "While I dont walk for transportation, I do walk with elderly clients for their health and wellness in their own residential areas. The Wesley/ Hedriks area is a busy and dangerous area for pedestrians without lightening fast reflexes. The area is currently having water and sewer line replacements. I am told they will be adding sidewalks. The wider the better, because in order to assist my client,

- it is best to be side by side. I am often pulling an oxygen tank as well."
- I enjoy walking at Foster Park but I am hearing impaired and i can't hear the bikers kids as well as adults to alert to move. I thought I had a right way to continue walking sidewalk. You see the reason why I request the bikers to build a pathway only so anyone with hearing impaired can be able to relaz and enjoy peacefully.
- † I do not use the bus system for transportation but I think it would be nice to have covered waiting areas that would help during rain or heat.
- * "My neighborhood, like many other older neighborhoods in the City, has very few, almost none really, sidewalks. And with every house using its garage as storage, a minimum of 2 -4 cars per household are parked on both sides of the streets. It is unsafe for anyone to walk with traffic and parking on both sides there is no safety zone for pedestrians. In addition, since the roads are so unsafe, kids walks across yards constantly on the way to and from school, breaking sprinlers, trampling flowers, etc. but that is preferable, I guess, to being run over. For a City of our size, we are woefully lacking in center city neighborhood amenities."
- Although there are sidewalks in many places, these are often not kept clear from brush and trash, especially in light of recent cuts. I would like to see the city work with various business to keep these clean and safe..perhaps businesses would be willing to trade off an amount of work for the consideration of putting a sign advertising there business..ie this sidewalk maintained by Tom's Lawn Care.
- Our property does not have a curb or a sidewalk on one edge, from the corner of Meadowbrook and Crestview on down Crestview. We have asked the city repeatedly to install at least a curb, and the answer is always that "it's on the list." Kids from Meadowbrook Middle walk by our house daily and then have no sidewalk and either cut through our yard or walk in the street. It is not safe for them or fair to us as homeowners. Please consider this relatively small request to have a sidewalk for the students. Thanks.
- Investigate the success of southern california's "paseos" in Santa Clarita / Valencia. Large bridges crossing major streets connecting various neighborhoods.
- * We really need some help in east fort worth. Thank you!
- As a special needs teacher at Western Hills High School, I take my students on the T some times and the intersection at Williams

- Rd/Cherry Lane and Camp Bowie West is horrible for trying to cross safely. Something needs to be improved there in order to cross CB West so we don't get stuck in the middle of the intersection before the light changes.
- † I am interested in forming or being a part of a citizen advisory group to address this very important issue.
- It seems to me that all the attention these days for community improvement happens near TCU or the cultural district. I don't know if east Fort Worth (Meadowbrook/Handley) is too poor of a community to enhance with sidewalks or bike paths, but as a working taxpayer it would be a blessing. We have a great hilly neighborhood to walk with beautiful tree lined streets, but we don't feel safe walking because of drivers who don't pay attention.
- * we copleted sidewalks between hulen and bryant irvin on overton ridge very dangerous
- No bus service in my area of Fort Worth and it is too dangerous to walk down Boat Club Road, across Jacksboro Highway to the nearest bus stop.
- The sidewalks by the river are very nice but need to be wider for walkers and bicyclist they travel so fast. Also if people with Dogs need to pick up POOP so do people riding horses. The riders should use a poop bag on the horse or pick up the poop it is all over the sidewalk. Gheeze at least go in the grass. I carry a water bottle but the water gets hot maybe a fountain. Loose dogs are still an issue for me to walk in my neighborhood there are still quite a few people who own pit bulls. Safety is another issue would like to walk around 8 to 9 because it is so hot but afraid to be down on the river trail that late it would be nice if law enforcement be requried to work out at various times in the evening so that someone is around. or could the citizen call and let someone know they will be on the trail late."
- I will reiterate my previous comments about making the sidewalks safe (level) in the Arlington Heights neighborhood. The creation of sidewalks where missing should have been done while the improvements were being made, but it is never too late to remedy this. It is a hazard to have to walk around these homes, in the street, where there is no sidewalk. Aside from the hazards from unlevel pavement, I worry about safety. There is a high crime rate here and lighting could be improved around street lamps, by

- pruning the trees. I stay away from the Montgomery area all together.
- I grew up with a sidewalk on every major roadway, and I walked everywhere. In the area of Fort Worth I live in, there are only sidewalks within the neighborhoods and very few on any major roadway making it near impossible and definitely unsafe for any pedestrian. We need to be able to walk and not have to take a car when we want to go to the store. We are giving our children the wrong messages when we choose not to walk because it is unsafe.
- * "I could do my shopping on foot but I don't feel I could safely navigate home. Because I have to walk on main roadways narrow, obstructed & overgrown walkways. I walked from Stockyard Station to Sylvanya park on Sunday. The smells from the plants in Northside (or maybe the water by the plants) were very unpleasant and I probably wont walk that way again. I was pleased to to the walking trails in that area are being improved."
- † Homeowners would be thrilled with a sideway on Hulen Street. (I-20 to Bellaire Drive)
- * "Since the bus system is the only transit that Fort Worth will allow for its citizens right now, we need to work with the 'T' and develop sidewalks, and the connectivity that is necessary. I am not going to ride the bus if there is no shelter, no sidewalk to get to the bus stop no traffic calming so you take your life in your own hands with traffic whizzing by. We are falling way behind as the most livable city. People will walk even in our heat if we provide the necessary infrastructure and shelter. It rains 90% of the days in Seattle but they didn't use ""rain"" as the excuse for not providing transit."
- † The city code should specify that all new developments provide sidewalks.
- * "I enjoy the recreational walkways around the parks. But walking for errands and other reasons are limited by sometime inadequate sidewalks and rest areas. We drive if there aren't going to be places to take a rest or get a drink of water or go to the restroom. Restrooms are an issue in Fort Worth especially in the parks. We normally hang with friends in Arlington at their parks because Fort Worth parks are very unwelcoming especially to people with children."
- PLEASE consider bike paths or trails for Far North Ft. Worth as well as Public transportation of some sort. We who live in the area are citizens of Ft. worth too but are so often forgotten.

- † I love to walk, Fort Worth is a beautiful city to walk in.
- All developments, including single family need to be installing pedestrian facilities, but the City needs to be cautious in prioritizing its expenditures. It seems like this is part of a coordinated plan to organize the priorities. Do all you can to get the message out to the residents that there are limited funds, but you have a budget to make priority improvements annually. As the revenue picks back up, fight for an increased share.
- Most major roads (i.e. University Drive) are not pedestrian friendly. I'd like to walk to the museums from TCU.
- we would walk more if we had sidewalks out of the neighborhood to the other schools in our area.
- † I would like to see more shade trees along Trinity River trails.
- † I walk around TCU, but we definately could use some cold water fountains for people and dogs
- please include bicycles in your planning
- * "I walk frequently for recreation & short errands. One of the most significant factors in where I walk is SHADE."
- As part of any plan to encourage walking, we need to better educate drivers in Fort Worth related to existing laws that protect pedestrians. Many drivers seem to think that drivers always have priority at intersections. Enforcement of traffic laws that protect pedestrians is essential.
- † Pedestrians need to be taught to walk against the traffic, This would greatly improve safety. Maybe place billboards to advise.
- As an Eastside resident- I often walk/jog the Trinity River for recreational purposes due to stray dogs in Stop Six. Also, the almost non-existant Police presence at parks are almost combined with poor lighting makes it nearly impossible to walk in East Fort Worth at night- so I often jog in the TCU/University area at night. Good lighting, police presence, and less stray dogs are my concerns with recreational walking in East Fort Worth; I'm sure the problems are even worse for children or those who walk as a primary mode of transportation. -Jay Johnson
- ★ More shade/ street trees would encourage me to walk futher. Too hot otherwise
- † I would like to see the city encourage walking and bike riding generally.
- Lets take FW to being green for the community that includes the quality of life and people living in the community.

- Honestly, I would like to see the entire neighborhood get sidewalks to help with pedestrian safety. However, I would settle for a safe route to school for my children.
- * Having sidewalks would encourage many to walk. At the moment, our roads are torn up and it is difficult to walk on the roads. If we had sidewalks, it would be much safer.
- How about designating pedestrian routes between parks and other pedestrian destinations, such as the Zoo and the Trinity Trails? The city has designated bicycle routes and made maps and street signs. I might do more recreational walking if I knew that there was a safe, improved sidewalk or trail all the way to the destination.
- Sidewalks greatly enhance the ease of walking in any part of Fort Worth, whether it is a neighborhood or along a busy thoroughfare.
- Few streets without sidewalks like White Settlement Rd in West Fort Worth. I cannot walk on the sides because of tall grasses.
- * "It would be a lot easier to be a pedestrian if our mass transit situation in the downtown vicinity improved. I don't understand why Fort Worth rejected \$25 million in Federal funds for a streetcar. It was a historic blunder, and a slap in the face to all the developers who are currently struggling through an economic crisis to invest in the core of our city. You want to drive economic growth and make Fort Worth pedestrian friendly, while reducing congestion of our suburban highways? Bring back the streetcar."
- Many parks Need lighting in Sector 22- when we patroled the other night there is a park across from the place we take our dog to Westcreek animal clinic- HAS NO LIGHTS!!!!!
- Clamp down on teens after dark-establish curfew 10 PM except maybe weekends
- The streets are very rough and uneven. I fell and broke my nose at Vega and Glenmont Dr. We need sidewalks to prevent being hit by a car.
- ★ Love the trinity trails... Keep extending
- Bus Stations aslo need to be easy walked to/also bus houses on all stations, which will protect against sun, rain, have to be installed on all stations. I am not a bus rider, but I see the customers waiting for the bus in the middle of the day in 105 F, and there is no shade around them.
- † i don't understand this survey. i don't want my TAX money going for anything. how many people will go on the Cities payroll to get

- people to walk? Over Taxed. once someone is on the city payroll he is paid retirement and insurance for life. what a gravy train.
- Safety! It would be nice to feel as safe walking anywhere in Ft. Worth as I do in Sundance Square. Whatever you are doing there is wonderful!
- † "I forgot University between white settlement and 199 could use sidewalks. Also University all along the Botanic Gardens. It is very difficult to cross between trinity park and the botanic gardens as well. I've seen improvements along 7th street. I don't understand why the new bridge across the trinity is going to the water treatment plant. Are you all going to improve trails on that side of the river?"
- * We need more sidewalks along Grandbury Road between Altamesa and Hulen.
- # drivers need to learn to watch for pedestrians and bicycles.
- More small shade trees should be planted along E. Lancaster and shaded benches should be placed on every block. As it is now, the street looks very desolate and uninviting to pedestrians and motorists alike.
- † I walk for exericse. I can not work the main street of my neighborhood Crowley & Sycarmore becuase there is no sidewalk
- children crossing sycamore school road to get home. Cars speed until school lights and there is a curve and hill where it makes it impossible to see children crossing the street until you see the lights.
- "To provide information regaring the transportation code for: Yielding to pedestrians in crosswalks, Speed limit in the downtown area, And also: Downtown walking maps"
- Fort Worth has done VERY poorly for too long when it comes to pedestrian resources. Fort Worth needs to install more sidewalks! Fort Worth needs to make corridors more pedestrian friendly! Fort Worth needs to improve pedestrian support on corridors and on bus routes! Stops along the 2000-3000 blocks of 8th Ave / Cleburne Rd are a perfect example of crappy pedestrian support.
- † I don't think that there are enough areas to walk in that are nice. There aren't enough recreation walking areas like hiking trails that are scenic, rather than just cement.
- * "My area is probably one of the better parts of FW as it is rather new. I would like to see more sidewalks in neighborhoods as I

- would walk with my grandson when I visit him in the Deauville Circle area and the large street leading to it."
- There needs so be more ramps and they need to be wide enough for wheelchair and scooter users to be able to cross ALL Major intersections in town.
- I do not get the 9th street suppression of bus traffic for foot traffickers. Get Buses off 9th except for Trolley and improve 6th and 7th for buses
- * For any residential housing development in Fort Worth City Limits, it should be mandated that sidewalks be constructed.
- we have a lot of sidewalk damage in our neighborhood due to tree roots.
- * People park their vehicles in driveways with the entire portion of the sidewalks unpassable, you have to walk in the street to get around the vehicles. This is a constant daily problem and should be a law against it if there is not one and then for that law to be fully enforced.
- * "I believe more residents would walk in the neighborhood with children and families if we had sidewalks to prevent having to walk in street only. The Ridglea West neighborhood has not had sidewalks in the past 30 years. Many residents enjoy walking for exercise, but take risks with heavy traffic on residential streets."
- † It would be nice if there was some way to walk across the Trinity River along I30. The only way to get across the Trinity River in that area is to drive.
- † I love what has been done along the Trinity River Trails and hope to see upkeep and progress in this area and am a huge supporter of the Trinity River Vision and am willing to pay more taxes to see this vision complete
- I don't have a car and I've been walking just about everywhere and I feel safe during the daytime hours but at night I can't say the same thing as for the daytime. The lighting is very poor in some areas near and around the bus stops, parks, schools and colleges. The downtown areas are well lighted but beyond that the lighting gets poor. It depends where you are going and whether it is the day or night.
- no sidewalks exist in these older neighborhoods and with narrow streets make it very dangerous.

- † There are not enough police present in the morning or afternoon hours when children are walking home from school. More police driving these neighborhoods would be a deterrent for offenders.
- * "When the bike and hike trails ever get expanded, make them wide enough for bikes and pedestrians or separate them. It seems that sidewalks weren't required in sub divisions after WWII, due to the mass of cars. Older 'hoods like Arlington Heights and Fairmount have NEIGHBORhood feel because of the walks. Many of these sidewalks, some close to a hundred years old, need repairing."
- As I stared earlier, I have looked at The T's bus schedules and it is a joke. It would take me over 2hrs to get to work near I-35 & Berry from River Park & SW BLDV. I would love to get rid of my car and am taking small steps to reduce the amount of driving I do, by cycling everywhere I can, because I am just tired of driving and sitting in traffic. I think it would be great if Ft. Worth could relize the potential of an efficient mass transit and go after it. I have lived in Ft Worth most of my life and after some extensive travels I have relized that I want to live somewhere where I do not have to rely on my car.
- Maintain sidewalks and the grassy areas along them...some are so overgrown that you can't even walk/ride a bike on them...especially in North Fort Worth (the forgotten area of Ft. Worth...we pay our taxes, but miss out on ammenities).
- crosswalks should be repainted more frequently and drivers reminded (public sewrvice announcements, etc.) that they are required to stop for pedestrians in crosswalks
- † I enjoy walking in fort Worth. Down town is great for walking.
- I would do more if it were safer.
- Do not allow contractors in new areas to build without sidewalks just as we did prior tho 1950. Also, add alleys for garbage pickup.
- It would be nice to link the Trinity trials to a well-marked bike path system that led to destinations -- shopping or other areas. I can see taking my bike on the Trinity Trail and going somewhere like Central Market (which is virtually impossible as things are now configured), Montgomery Plaza / So 7 (more difficult than it has to be), or downtown (the bike paths and areas to lock your bike could be improved. Walks to those destinations are not out of the question either.
- † "It is just too dangerous to walk, rollerblade or even bike down Harlanwood, because o fthe speed of the traffic. I wish we could

- either gate the community or get cameras through the neighborhood for speeders. Coming down the Bellaire Hill, traveling west (or even east) the traffic is awful-they speed horribly-why can't we put cameras in coming down that hill-the city would make a fortune! thank you"
- † This is the single, most significant threat to the safety of a large number of children in our neighborhood including my own.
- † I do support the idea of making destinations within a mile or so of neighborhoods more walkable.
- * "Sidewalks in neighborhoods clear the roads for drivers. They also make it safer for walkers/joggers. With teenage drivers in a city that really doesn't favor pedestrians it can be scary for both them, their parents and the walkers/joggers. Also kids need to be able to move along safely. Actualy walking time at busy street intersections like Hulen/Bellaire would promote walking to and from short destinations and therefore improved health benefits would be seen.
- Pedestrian friendly cities promote a healthier and friendlier lifestyle."
- † The new bicycle paths are nice.
- † Thank you for conducting the survey. I support the initiative to make Fort Worth more pedestrian friendly to increase our citizens' activity level and decrease our automobile emissions.
- † "I love Fort Worth for the paths to and along the Trinity River. My family and I use them often for exercise and recreation. I think the maintenance of these paths and parks should be a priority for Fort Worth because they are one of the greatest assets of the city."
- † I would love to have more sidewalks to walk to shopping as it is a healthier lifestyle and its enjoyable.
- * Would love to ride bikes with my daughter on Trinity Trails, but no safe bike route for children to get to the trails. Also, driving to the trails, leaves your car vulnerable to thiefs who watch for people leaving their cars and getting on the trails.
- hartwood Dr. needs a sidewalk for access to the Overton Park.

 However, it would impact the residents yard on either side of the street.
- Something is needed on the new Hulen bridge.
- † Tanglewood and the areas mapped to Tanglewood school district are filled with young children. Sidewalks around the neighborhood would provide a much safer and more positive walking experience.

- * Fort Worth is a great place to live. The one drawback has been lack of sidewalks in many neighborhoods. When I moved here 40 years ago the first thing I said when being shown around the city was "Where are the sidewalks?"
- It would be great to have sidewalks in order to walk to destinations, such as, shopping, grocery, errands, dinning or just being able to walk somewhere to hang out. As it is, I do not do so as Bellaire Drve South is a very busy vehicle road. It's dangerous to try and walk or bike anywhere from home unless you're running on the trails, unfortunately that's not great for going anywhere. The trails are awesome for working out, but not practical for errands.
- * "I live in Downtown where it is very safe at all hours, and we have good sidewalks, traffic lighting and police presence. What I notice, is that when walking or riding bicycles across any of the Bridges surrounding Downtown(Main St going north is a good example), somtimes there are no sidewalks at all, or they are very narrow. With traffic sometimes passing at more than 40 miles per hour, walking on these narrow ledges or in the street, is very dangerous. Also, we cross Rosedale a lot on the Southside. The pedestrian crossing light stays on for a very short period of time. You can barely get off the sidewalk before the hand turns orange and the light turns yellow. There is never enough time to safely cross the street.... even on a bicycle!"
- † I live on Hartwood Drive. Sidewalks and more street lights would make walking more convenient and safer on our street and all of the streets in our neighborhood.
- need to promote mixed use buildings, siting businesses together with residential facilities to encourage foot traffic rather than car traffic.
- † It would be helpful to have covered seating at various places on walking paths to provide cover during sleet, rain or hot sun. The bus stops need covered seating too. drinking fountains and covered trash cans might be needed too.
- Raised pedestrian bridges at several busy intersections would facilitate movement and reduce time spent stewing in the hot summer sun.
- † The trinity river trails need more misting stations and while there are many water fountains none of them ever work, please try and fix them.
- * would like to see more sidewalks in residential areas

- * "many streets dont have sidewalks forcing pedestrians to walk on the street. Also many people park in the middle of the sidewalk once again forcing pedestrians to walk on the street. Even the bus stops dont have benches or shelter from sun or rain."
- ★ Just need a safe walking area fro pleasure & excersise.
- † There just too short of a time to walk across a street
- More time is needed on crosswalk signals at large intersections. An example is Bryant Irvin and Oakmont. When the light turns green for the traffic and pedestrians, almost immediately the caution starts signaling the pedestrian and a person must almost run to get across the street to beat on coming traffic.
- the city has made downtown F/W basically a tourist friendly area, but once you leave the downtown corridor the individual has to fend for him/herself especially in the older neighborhoods.
- † It is important to have physical exercise in today's overburdened healthcare system. Safety has to be first, followed by cosmetic changes. I don't feel safe walking at night. Crime happens to fast.
- * "Walking dogs is a past time of many of my neighbors, it would be HELPFUL to have some ordinance signs about picking up after you animal on walking routes. Even in the neigborhood. Runners have a heck of time running from sidewalks to the gravel/dirt/no sidewalk places in my zipcode."
- * "Seeing so many bus stops that have no cover from the sun and rain, or any type of seating, is unacceptable. Also, I think that every developer of every neighborhood and every shopping area sould be REQUIRED to put in sidewalks. This should have been required decades ago!!!"
- Really need sidewalks in the North Ridglea neighborhood, for the residence and kids to be safe and the go on thier daily walks and bike rides.
- I understand the area I reside in is currently under a lot of construction and certain things will take some time. However, I am within walking distance of a beautiful shopping area under development and if there was a safe pedestrian friendly way of getting there, I know my kids and I would bike there. I've seen pedestrian only bridges in several parts of the country that go over highways and thought that would be a great idea over I35 in the Alliance area. The sidewalks are getting developed in the Presidio area but we still need them on Harmon Rd. Once the development is completed in that area, the pedestrian only bridge would be a

- great addition that I'm sure everyone that runs, walks and bikes in the neighborhood would definitely use.
- I just moved from Forest Hill to Crowley area. Same problem there (it is Fort Worth). Crowley Road, Sycamore, Altamesa, McCart have lots of businesses within walking distance from neighborhoods. Cannot walk there, though, becuase of lack of sidewalks so if there is only room for high speed vehicles to whiz past you- it discourages walking. Since no sidewalks, many walk dangerously in side lane of roads. There are gas stations, grocery stores, restaurants, but no sidewalks for pedestrians to safely get there. I would like to walk, but the grass and big rocks make it uncomfortable to do and I cannot walk along the road for fear of getting run over. Because of the high concentration of apartment complexes in this area- many of the tenants are low-income and have no vehicle and must walk these streets on the road or dangerously close to traffic.
- "I reside in The Tanglewood/Overton Park Area. I believe this area was built without sidewalks in order to preserve the natural appearance, including of course, the trees. The Park Area where the creek is has a nicely done walk way. During a recent meeting of home owners[those whose homes face a street due for reconstruction]with city engineers- the question of adding sidewalks came up. My memory of that meeting is that only one family showed any interest in having sidewalks. Back to The Park for a moment-people still walk and run in the street-even where there is sidewalk available. My opinion-This residential area will not be improved by putting in sidewalks."
- Need a walking park such as River Legacy. It's safe, lots of parking lots with security cameras. Many trails of different lengths and one large 1.3 mile circle.
- A walking path in the area of 76244 from Heritage Trace Pkwy, N Beach, toward N Tarrant Pkwy, using the vacant land available could promote walking to schools with a designated neighborhood guard, and to shopping areas for seniors and young moms for exercise. There are several schools in the area.
- † "I think streets which border city parks should have a mandatory 20 mph instead of a suggested speed limit. Candleridge Park is a prime example of that. All of French Lake Drive should be 20 miles per hour and not just a suggested warning sign saying 20 mph. There are very few vehicles that heed the suggested speed limit and it is

- just a matter of time until a pedestrian will be hit or a child will be killed."
- † There are too many bicyclists on Ten Mile Bridge Rd and Robertson Road. There are trees, limbs, debris, and bushes all the way to the road (edge of the pavement) on those roads and on Bowman Roberts from WJ Boaz to W Bailey Boswell Rd.
- * Repair the sidewalks on Mistletoe Drive!
- Add a pedestrian bridge over the Clear Fork connecting the Mistletoe Heights neighborhood to the University Plaza shopping area. Also connect the Mistletoe Heights neighborhoods Trinity Park on the east side of the Clear Fork by adding a walk from the Zoo along the east side of the Clear Fork and under the railroad bridge, and under I-30.
- Fort Worth is by far the most pedestrian-unfriendly (and bike-unfriendly) city I've lived in, and I've lived all over the US. I see efforts to make it better in the "trendy" areas (7th) but what about where real people who don't have cars live? The people who have to walk, or bike, not just those doing so because it is currently "fashionable".
- As a walker who walks ACROSS town frequently, Fort Worth is very challengind and un-friendly to walkers unless you stay in a single neighborhood. (Oh, I remembered another place. We need a sidewalk or lane to walk down that big hill on Bellaire, between Tanglewood and TCU.) I would love for FW to be more pedestrian friendly.
- † I love that in Europe it is possible to walk to so many locations. I would love to be able to walk from my neighborhood to the downtown area especially. I find it frustrating that there is no safety for pedestrians where my neighborhood connects to this area. Thanks for asking!
- Most of my walking in Fort Worth is downtown. I feel that the downtown area is very well maintained and an enjoyable experience for walking. I am not aware of any signal timings that do not allow enough time to cross safely.
- I would like to see Fort Worth citizens walking and riding their bikes all around our city. To do this, sidewalks MUST be built throughout all of our neighborhoods and along our street. Fort Worth citizens must feel safe.
- * "If there were a solid transportation system in FW, with set time schedules posted at the stops, and stops at reachable destinatons, I

- would happily take a bus to and from downtown. We need PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION in combination with pedestrian walks."
- Additionally, the medians and curves at Circle Park Blvd. and Park Street are in need of extensive repairs. The whole area needs a total "face lift." This residential area is near the Historic Stockyards where visitors will get their first impression of Fort Worth.
- "I strongly believe that making Fort Worth a walking community (and more public transportation friendly) area will not only improve safety, but will encourage residents to walk, therefore increasing health and air quality. There are many businesses near my residence that I would love to walk to, however I have children and I would not feel safe bringing them via walking to these places, mostly due to lack of sidewalks. We live less than one mile from my child's school, but I do not feel comfortable allowing him to walk, even when accompanied by an adult because of the lack of sidewalks, crossing guards and road quality in my area. Having moved here from Washington DC, Northen VA area, I miss, not only the conveinence of living in a walking community, but also the public transportation. I love Fort Worth, Texas and there is very little I would change, but the walking/public transportation system would be at the top of my list. Thank you for the opportunity to voice my opinion!"
- As a rule Fort Worth does a pretty good job. The area that needs help is the one that you are trying most to promote -- 7th Street. The sidewalks are broken and sometimes not usuable, or the concrete is broken especially along the east side of Universtiy between Lancaster and 7th Street. For the most part the buses are good and timely, but do not run late enough. We need and longer bus on Zoo Wednesday, or more frequency.
- † This a growing community with a lot of active famalies. Biking and waling trails would definitely be useful.
- * Within Summerfields neighborhood off of Beach and Western Center and Basswood, there are speeding car issues on Spoonwood, sidewalk repair issues, and lighting issues. I would also love to see a sidewalk down Riverside drive behind Summerfields.
- Before placing sidewalks in the neighborhoods. Poll all neighbors prior to spending money on sidewalks that may not be wanted or needed in certain area. When funds are available use them wisely.

- † Thank you for your interest in wanting to help the situation.

- "I would love to walk more in my neighborhood of West Meadowbrook but without destinations and business development. I drive out of my neighborhood. I'd love more business development in East FW to encourage more walking and bike riding. Also, too many people speed down Meadowbrook between Oakland and Beach. Better visible crosswalks, blinking pedestrian signs, kids at play signs and some electronic speed signs would help slow down traffic in the area and make it safe for walkers and cyclists. Again, the women and children crossing at Ben Ave and Meadowbrook Dr are vulnerable every time they cross. The intersection is at the bottom of the hill, east-west traffic does not slow down and they have to scurry across dragging their children behind them. The city and a non profit are offering these women great services but the journey is dangerous. There is no crosswalk and there should be one. A blinking pedestrian sign would help slow the 40mph traffic to the legal 30mph."
- Many people walk and run in our neighborhoods (Mistletoe Heights, Berkley, Park Hill, etc.). A large amount of the sidewalks are dangerous or there are no sidewalks at all. People, therefore, walk or run in the streets in these areas. That's a very dangerous situation, as is walking or running on the sidewalks in need of repair or replacement. In the city neighborhoods where people use sidewalks as much as they are used in our neighborhoods, the City should make the effort to repair or replace them BEFORE someone is injured by falling or being hit by an automobile in the street.
- "shade trees to line walkways. water fountains, urban dog runs/park"
- ★ Our family would make walking a bigger priority if sidewalks were installed.
- "For a brief period, I lived in Europe. Walking there was a way a life. The city had converted an old river that had been diverted into a park that was already throughout the city. I walked several miles a day and it was very pleasant, even in very hot temperatures. It was safe, clean, pleasant to look at, and increased the standard of living for all the parts of the city. Please look at Valencia, Spain for a great example of what is possible for master parks planning. A project like this would further define Fort Worth as a destination city, as well as enhance the quality of life for all residents. Thank you for this opportunity to provide comments."

- Speed bump around 3000 hardwood drive would be very valuable. There is a bend in road, cars tend to speed there and it is a main entrance into Overton park. Lots of runners and children crossing the street there with very limited visibility and drivers speeding. Accident waiting to happen!
- † "1.Fort Worth can be greatly improved mobility wise if we did have greater options for walking. Also making sure that walkers can walk safely with bikes, cars, and buses within the city. 2.Also improvements to our signal lights so that we have more time to cross at various intersections.(Especially in the downtown area)."
- † "There is no pedestrian facilities in Fort Worth. The people who ride the buses needs to wait in the open, no protection from rain or sun. Major issue is the traffic do not respect the right to cross the street on intersections included all Fort Worth; no white line on road. Major Streets are too wide and do not give enough time to the pedestrian to cross the streets. No sidewalks in the back streets.
- Loose dogs or houses with big dogs and bad fence; safety is an issue. Big bushes or tall grass force to walk on the road."
- One of the reasons that I live where I do is because of the walkability of the neighborhood. I have a car and can afford gas, but enjoy being outside and interacting with my community. Last May our family went the entire month without driving our car.

 Unfortunately the West 7th area is about the only part of town you can do that in.
- The sidewalks throughout my neighborhood Berkeley -are buckled and broken. We pay very high property taxes and I have consistently been told that there are no funds to improve our sidewalks. Ours is a neighborhood that is active and spans many different age groups. I know more people would walk and use the sidewalks instead of the street if the sidewalks were safer. Additionally lifting the rule that homeowners can't make improvements to their sidewalks except with contractors that are approved by the city prevents many 'do it yourselfer's' from taking care of this problem on their own. I see no problem with the city inspecting a final product but give us the option to do it ourselves. Also charging any kind of fee for us to do it ourselves is inappropriate as well."
- THE MOTOR VEHICLES IN MY AREA SCARE THE CRAP OUT OF ME!
- Most of my walking is downtown while on city business. Most areas are fine and I feel safe. The biggest problem I see is drivers not

obeying the crosswalk guides at intersections. When they don't stop their vehicles behind the crosswalk lines, it puts the pedestrian in danger to cross the intersection. More police enforcement is needed to ensure that both pedestrians and drivers obey the laws regarding crossing the street.
