

#### WHAT IS THE ONE SECOND COLLABORATIVE?

The One Second Collaborative was established in September 2022 by joint approval of the Tarrant County Commissioners Court and the Fort Worth City Council and is a coalition in partnership with the Fort Worth Police Department, the City of Fort Worth, and Tarrant County, to use an evidence-based approach to address youth gun violence in Tarrant County, Texas.

This initiative is supported by ARPA funding administered by Tarrant County and the City of Fort Worth.















#### PROGRAM GOAL


Reduce violence crime in targeted communities, improve capacity of community & based organizations, suppress youth violence

- Reduce teen shooting deaths by 5% annually as demonstrated by FWPD crime data
- Decrease violent crime in the City of Fort Worth by 10% in 12 months





#### **WORK GROUPS - EXPECTATIONS AND DELIVERABLES**

- Identify co-chairs to lead the process (One Content Expert and One Community Member)
- Hold weekly meetings over 8 weeks hold meetings at times that are accessible to community members
- Develop 1-3 SMART goals specifically related to the work group topic, that focus on those most at risk of being impacted by community violence
- Identify a goal owner for each goal which organizations can help us move and monitor the progress of each goal
- · Define the timeline for each goal when will the goal be completed
- Submit goal recommendation to OSC Steering Committee



#### YOUTH ADVISORY BOARD

To allow youth from the community to bring youth perspectives, feelings and solutions.

Members make a difference by:

- Educating the public on the issues that youth face due to gun violence associated with mental health, emotional issues or behavioral disorders.
- Influencing youth crime policy and change
- Providing peer support
- Becoming better self-advocates
- Developing leadership skills

#### **MULTI-DISCIPLINARY TEAM (MDT)**

Composed of professionals from the fields of probation, outreach, education, and social services, whose primary focus will be to receive, and case manage the intervention targets as well as identify additional interventions, preventions and suppression activities needed in the targeted community and in collaboration with the youth/family.
