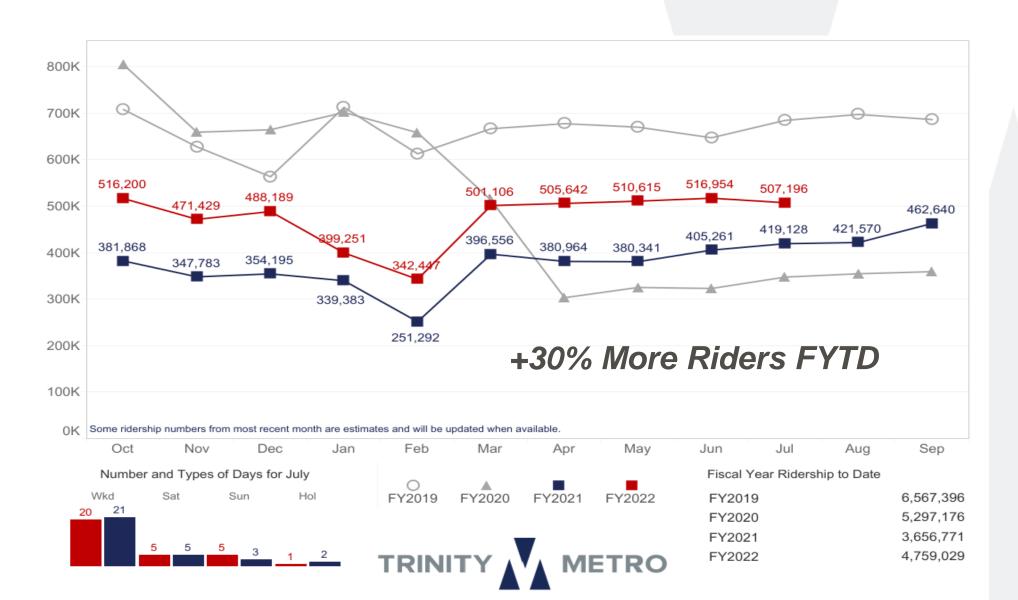

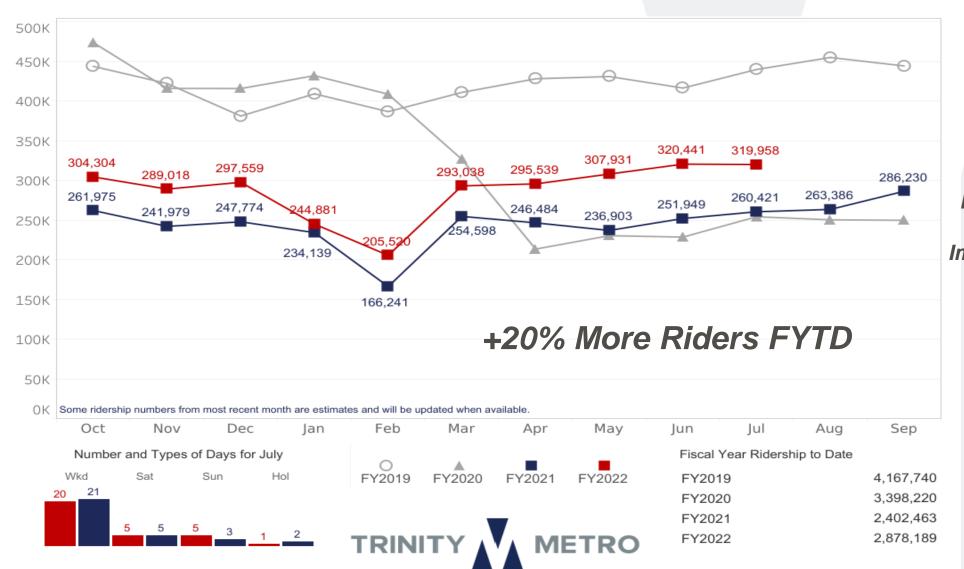

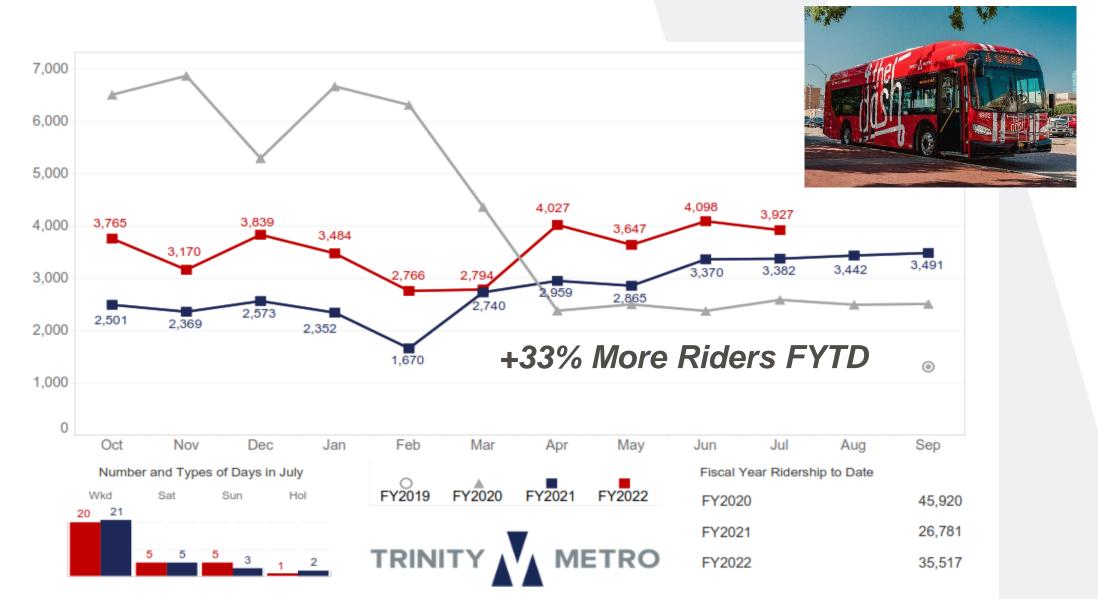


Fixed Route Bus Monthly Ridership

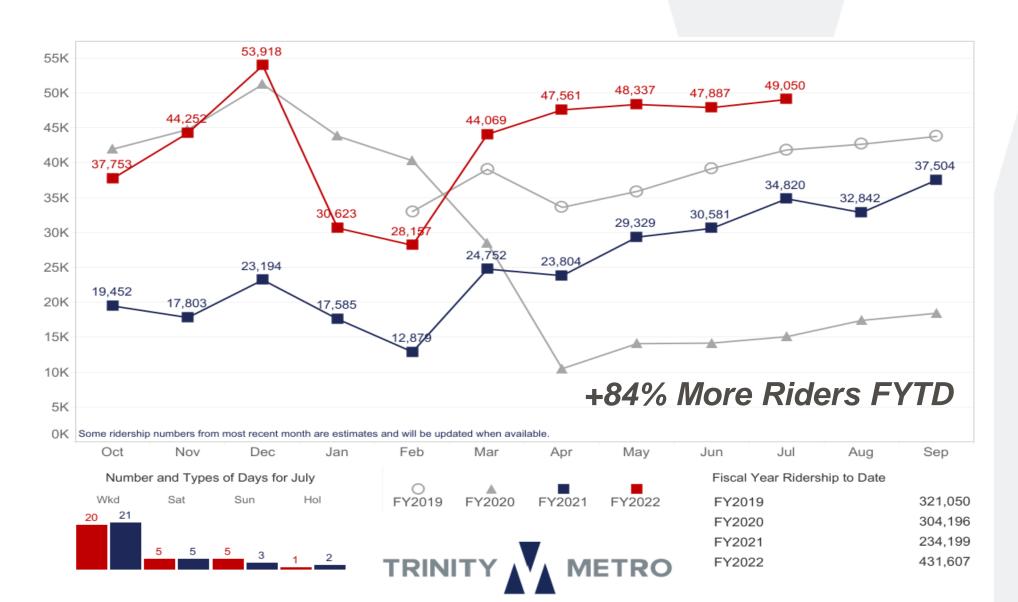




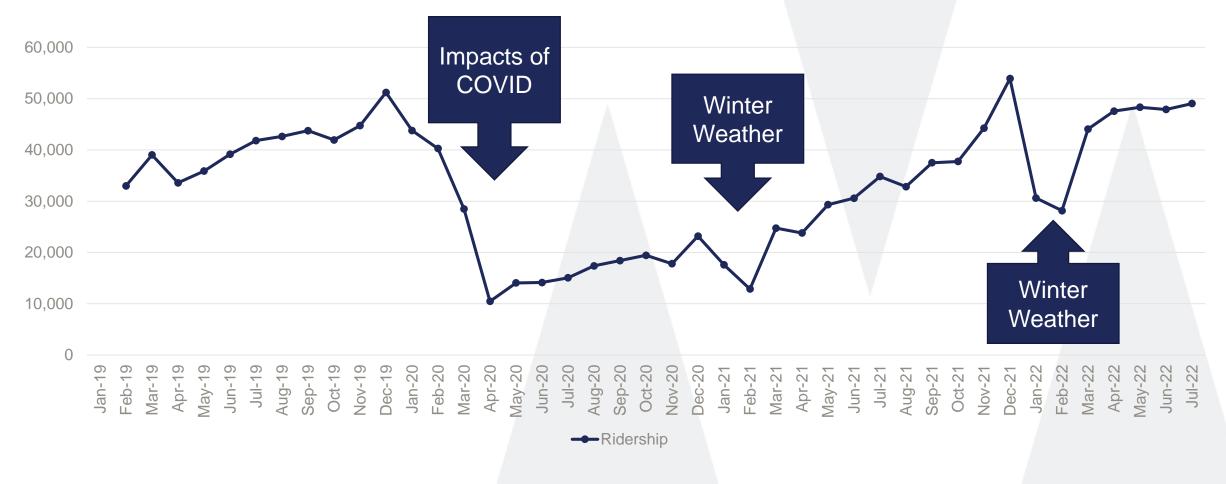
Dash (Route 50) Ridership

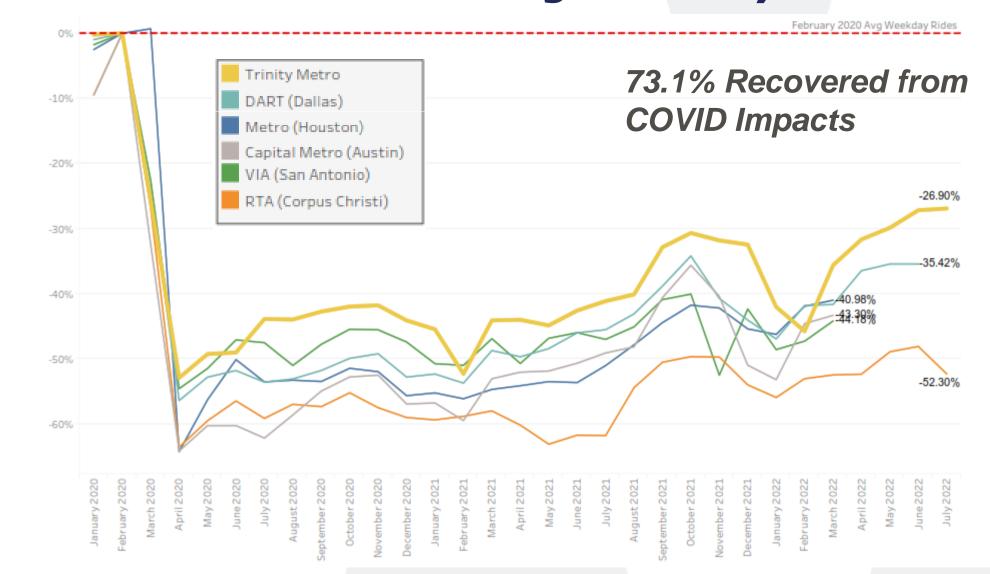

Overview of Programs



Bus Stop Improvement Program

- Bus Stops are the first interaction with the transit service
- Aged bus benches and shelters
- Almost 1,700 bus stops across the system
- FY23 starts a 3-year \$7M program to modernize and replace benches and shelters
- \$1M from NCTCOG to help with concrete shelter pads
- Bus Stop Clean-up Day Oct 22



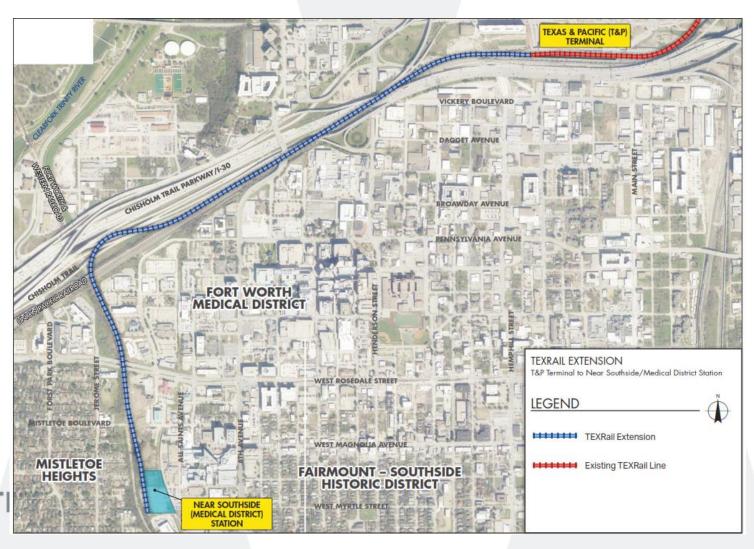

TEXRail Extension



- 2-mile rail extension from T&P Station to Near Southside Station in the Medical District
- 1 new rail station with 100 parking spaces
- Project Cost: \$167 million
 - \$7.1M from City of Fort Worth
 - \$48.0M from Trinity Metro
 - \$111.9 from Federal Sources
- Coordinating Partners:

 Baylor, Scott & White, Fort
 Worth & Western Railroad,
 Union Pacific Railroad

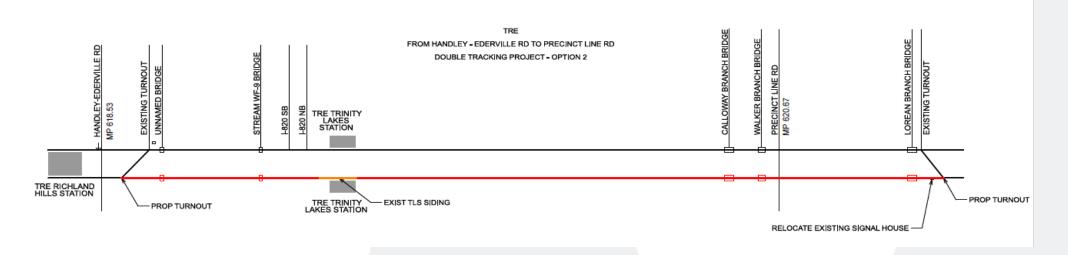

- Station Opens: Oct 2023



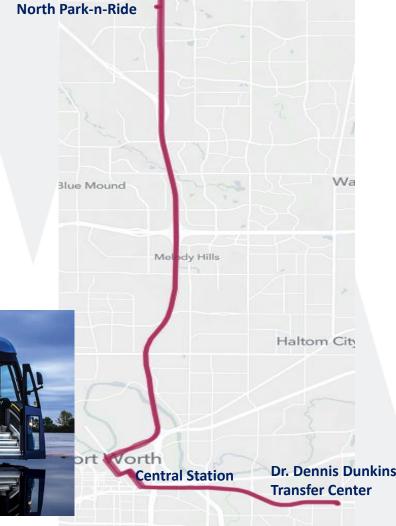

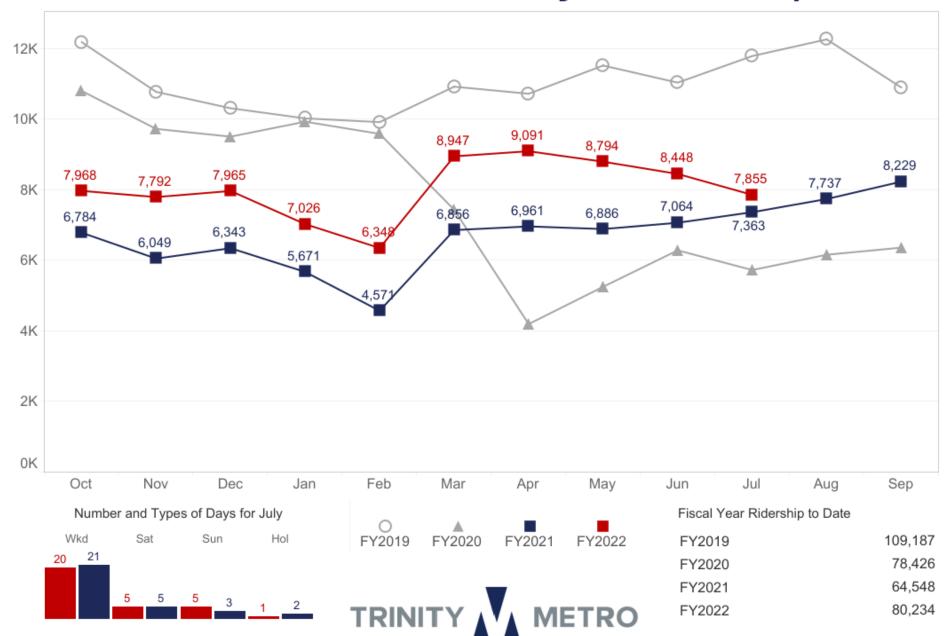

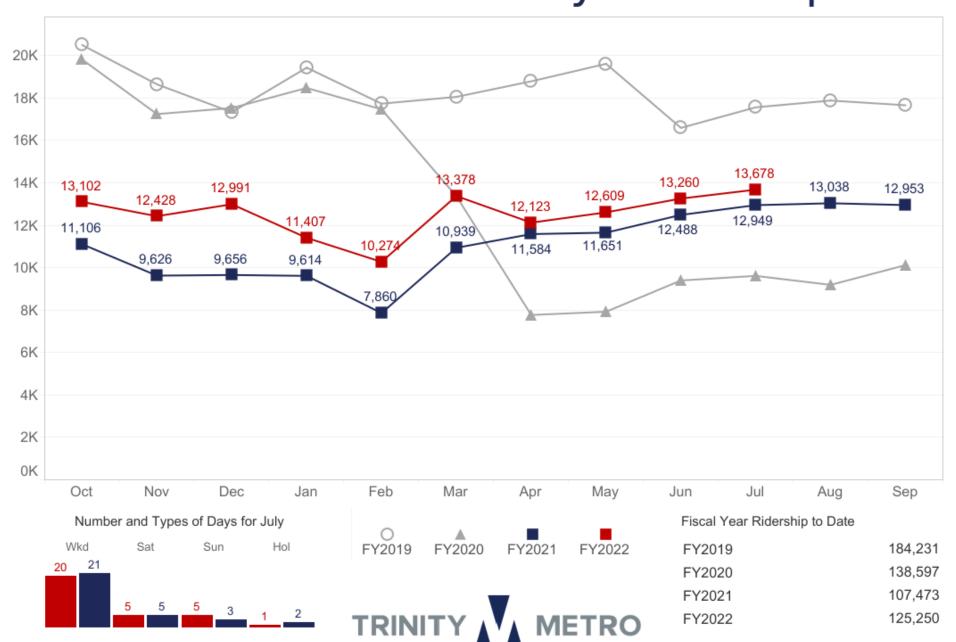
TRE Monthly Ridership



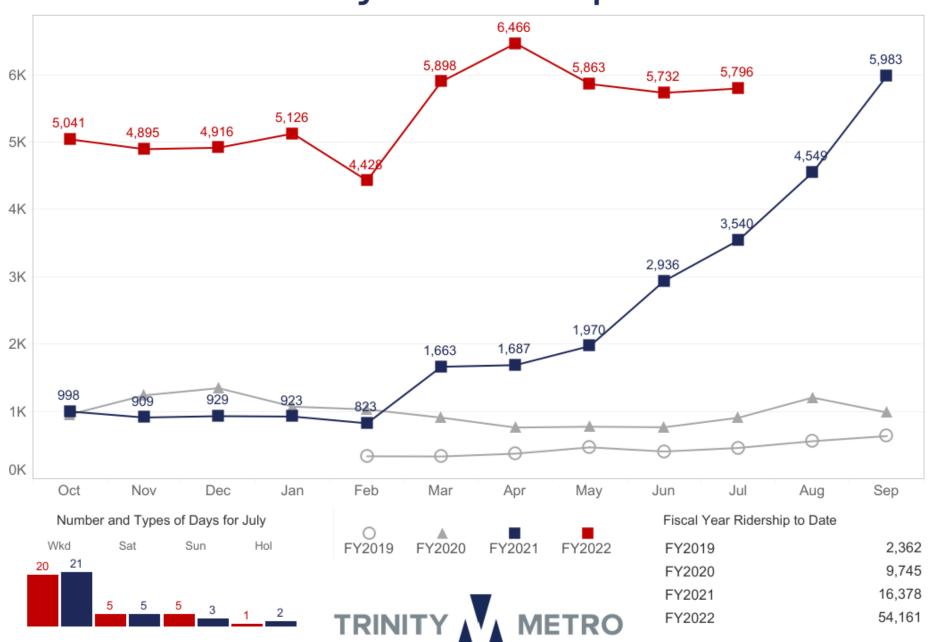
ACCESS InHouse Monthly Ridership



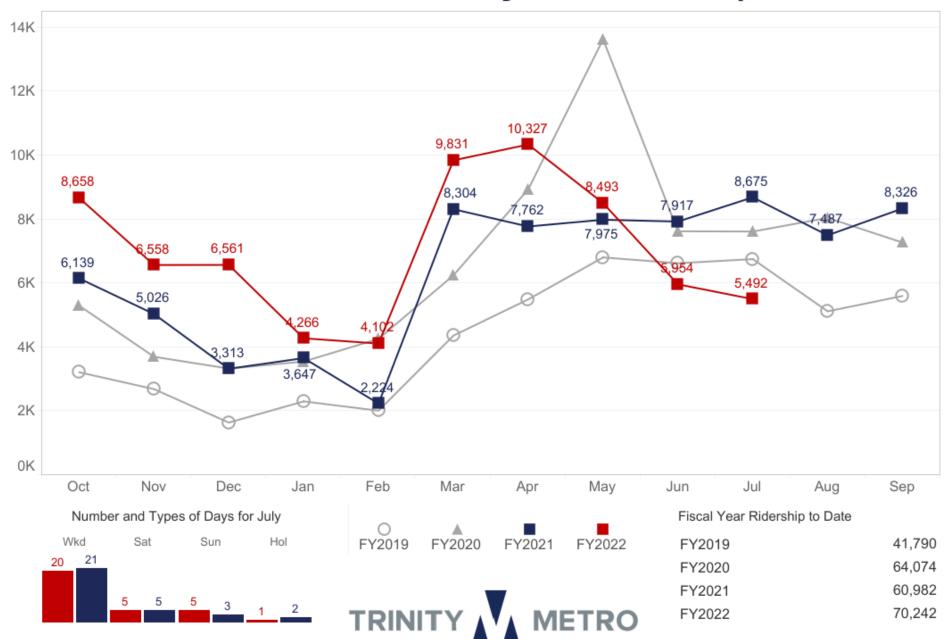
ACCESS Contract Monthly Ridership



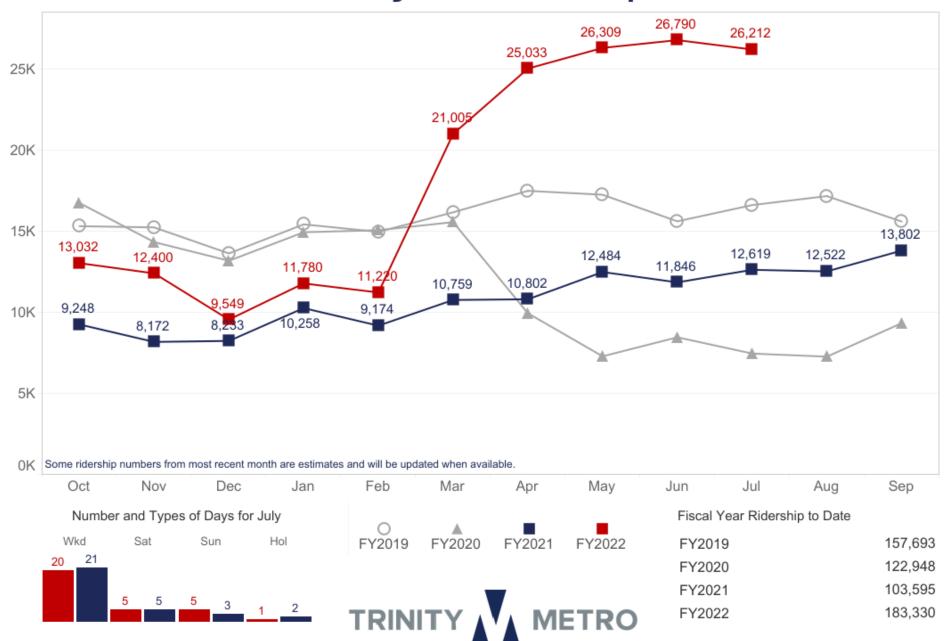
ZIPZONE Monthly Ridership



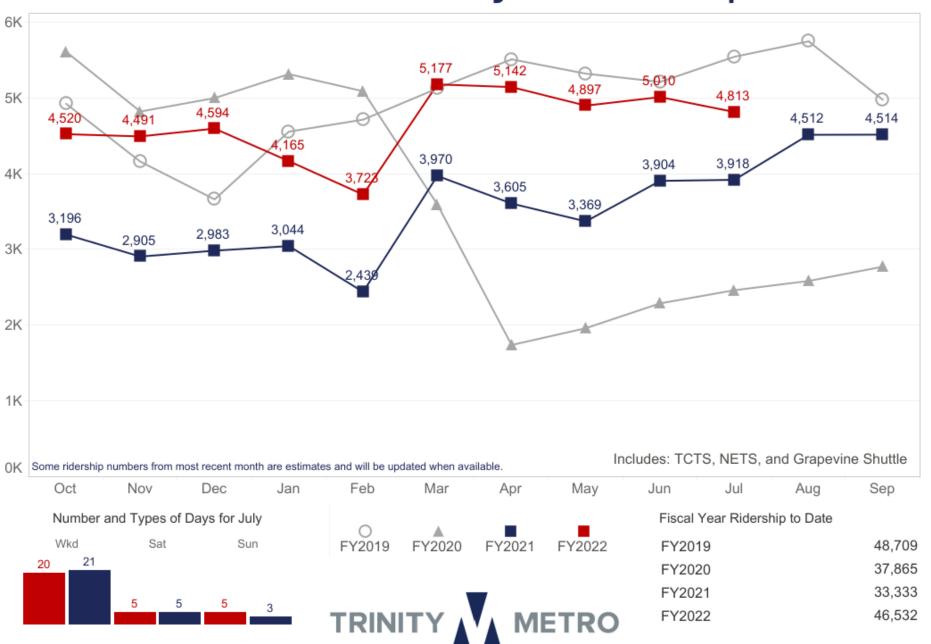

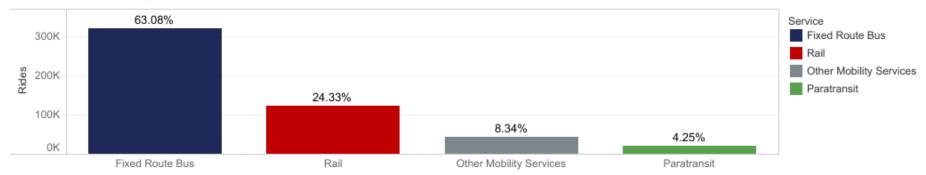

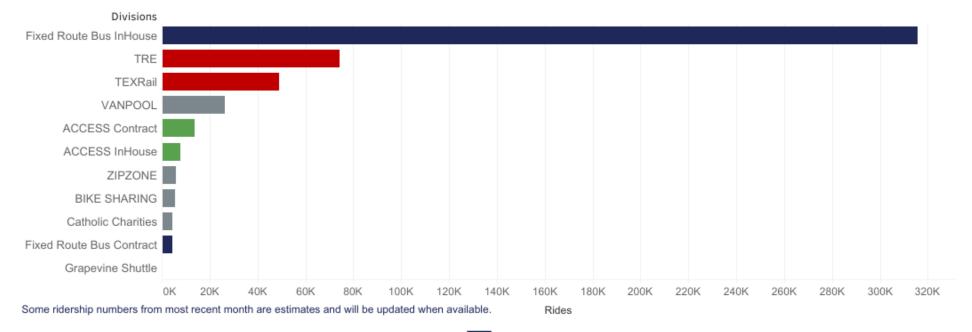
